RUSTICUS.

AN ACT fixing the times of holding Courts in the several Circuits, and for other purposes.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, That the counties of Green and Orange shall be attached to and form a part of the first Judicial Circuit in this state; and the county of Crawford shall be attached to and form a part of the fourth Judicial Circuit within this state; and the county of Bartholomew shall be attached to and form a part of the second Judicial Circuit in this state.

Sec. 2. That the Circuit courts to be held in the first Judicial Circuit, shall be held on the days and times following

shall sit at each term as follows, viz:

to wit: in the county of Green on the fourth Mondays in March and Septem-

ber; in the county of Knox on the first Mondays in April and October; in the

county of Sullivan on the third Mondays in April and October; in the county of

Vigo on the fourth Mondays in April and

October; in the county of Parke on the

fifth Mondays in April and October; in

the county of Owen on the first Mondays in May and November; in the county

of Monroe on the Thursdays next suc-

ceeding the first Mondays in May and

November; in the county of Lawrence

on the second Mondays in May and No-

ember; in the county of Orange on the

third Mondays in May and November;

in the county of Martin on the fourth

Mondays in May and November; in the

county of Davies on the first Mondays in

June and December, in each and every

year, & shall sit in each term as follows:

in the county of Knox two weeks; in the

counties of Green, Sullivan, Vigo, Parke,

Lawrence, Orange, Martin and Davies,

six days each; and in the counties of Ow-

en and Monroe, three days each, if the

business before any of the above named

courts require it.

Sec. 3. The Circuit courts in the se-

cond Judicial Circuit, shall be held on

the days and times following, to wit: in

the county of Harrison on the third Mon-

days in February, May and September;

in the county of Washington on the fourth

Mondays of February, May and Septem-

ber; in the county of Jackson on the first

Mondays in March, June and October;

in the county of Bartholomew on the se-

cond Mondays in March, June and Octo-

ber; in the county of Scott on the third

Mondays in March, June and October;

in the county of Jefferson on the fourth

Mondays in March, June & October; in the

county of Clark on the second Mondays in

April and August, and on the third

Mondays in November; and in the

county of Floyd on the second Mondays in

May, September and December; and

the Circuit courts in the counties of Je-

fferson & Clark shall sit twelve days each

if the business therein requires it; and

in all other counties in the said Circuit,

the court shall sit six days in each, if the

business requires it.

Sec. 4. The Circuit courts in the third

Judicial Circuit, shall be held in the se-

veral counties composing the said Cir-

cuit, at the times hereinafter mentioned:

in the county of Jennings on the first

Monday in February, fourth Monday in

May, and first Monday in September; and

shall sit six days if the business requires

it; in the county of Ripley on the Wed-

nesday preceding the commencement of

the courts in Jennings county, and shall

sit three days if the business require it;

in the county of Switzerland on the se-

cond Monday in February, first Monday in

June and second Monday in Septem-

ber, and shall sit six days if the business

require it; in the county of Dearborn on

the third Monday in February, second

Monday in June, and third Monday in

September, and shall sit twelve days if

the business requires it; in the county

of Franklin on the first Monday in March

fourth Monday in June and first Monday

in October, and shall sit nine days if the

business require it; in the county of U-

nion on the second Thursdays after the

commencement of the courts in Franklin

county, and shall sit three days if the busi-

ness require it; in the county of Fayette

on the third Monday in March, se-

cond Monday in July, and third Monday

in October, and shall sit six days if the busi-

ness require it; in the county of Wayne

on the fourth Monday in March. Our govern-

ment was formed in peace, and the Treasury

knowledge, it is very clear that gov. Bibb is

the person recognized by the legisla-

ture, and the new speaker thus became

governor, and the speaker must be chosen to

fill the office of speaker, and so there would be

an endless succession of speakers and governors. The absurdity of this is too

apparent not to be seen, even by the
