## DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT SUR- INAM.

BARRADORS, JAN. 29.

D. J. Presburg, Esq. L. D. of the  
Colony of Surinam, arrived here on Sun-  
day evening, the 28th instant, despatched  
hither by his Excellency Governor Val-  
aiant, with a communication, to his Hon-  
or President Brathwaite Skeete, and se-  
veral respectable Commercial Houses  
here, of an alarming fire, which took  
place in the town of Paramaribo, on Sun-  
day 21st inst. at 1 o'clock, P. M. com-  
mencing near the residence of W. A.  
Caistairs, Esq. on the green; and burnt  
with unabated fury until Tuesday morn-  
ing 23d inst. laying in ashes the whole of  
the front part of the town, as far back as  
the residence of Adam Cameron, Esq.  
taking in its way the whole of the houses  
and spacious stores, from one end of the  
water side to the other, leaving the great-  
er part of the population destitute of  
house, home, shelter of any kind, or pro-  
vision, every species of which was con-  
sumed by the devouring element. It is  
said that 600 houses were burnt to the  
ground.

Serious Fire at New-York.—A little  
before 1 o'clock on Sunday morning,  
(March 4.) a fire broke out in one of the  
buildings corner of Broadway and Ful-  
ton streets, which consumed 8 or 10 build-  
ings before it was got under.

NEW YORK, MARCH 4.

We have received files of the Paris  
Constitutionnel, an anti-ministerial paper,  
from the 1st to the 18th January inclu-  
sive. No news of importance is contain-  
ed in them. The Chambers were in ses-  
sion, but were mostly occupied with dis-  
cussions relating to the revenue and ex-  
penses of the year, and to some matters  
of inferior importance, relating to their  
internal affairs.

From England, all the news relates to  
the state of public opinion and feeling  
concerning the Queen, and to addresses  
to the King and Parliament, inquiry into  
the conduct of the Ministry. The  
Queen, it seems, is to remain in England.

In Spain, affairs seem to go on in a  
regular course, and the new government  
seems likely to be permanent, and to en-  
sure the public tranquility and promote  
the national welfare. The King had  
summoned the Cortes to deliberate on  
his invitation to attend the Congress of  
Kings at Laybach.

Naples seems to attract the general  
attention. Its Parliament was in session,  
and seemed to be animated with firmness  
in its determination to maintain the inde-  
pendence of the country, and its right to  
maintain the government it had adopted,  
at the hazard of a war. The King had  
gone to meet the Sovereigns at Laybach;  
but the whole of his kingdom is active  
in preparations of various kinds, in con-  
templation of an approaching war, and  
this activity is represented as springing  
from the people. No new movements of  
the Austrian troops have recently taken  
place.

Portugal remained tranquil: the pub-  
lic attention was occupied with the  
choice of Deputies to the Cortes; the e-  
lections were conducted in good order,
