VINCENNES, OCTOBER 6, 1821.

The Evansville Gazette informs us that Elisha Harrison has been elected Brigadier General in the twelfth brigade of Indiana militia, over James McCulley. And also that col. John I. Neely has been elected Brigadier General of 2d brigade, without opposition, vice. R. M. Evans, resigned.

The sale of public lands, for the north part of Delaware District, commenced on Monday last, and is progressing rapidly. Much competition exists among the purchasers. A large number of tracts have been sold as high as from 2 to \$6 per acre, and considerable more probably will before the close of the sales.—*Del. Gaz.*

We announce with pleasure, that the commissioners appointed to superintend the removal of obstructions to the navigation of the Ohio river, between this place and Wheeling, commenced their labors yesterday. They appear to be well provided with implements and boats.

DOYLESTOWN, Pa. July 31.

To those who have never wandered far from home, and are unacquainted with the enterprising spirit of Northern Men, the following anecdotes may be interesting:

A gentleman living on the head waters of the Susquehanna, in the state of New York, entered into contract for furnishing the necessary timber for the *City Hall*, at Washington, the seat of government of the United States. During the last winter, the active axe-men were employed—the timber hewed—hailed to the river—and early in the spring formed into rafts of convenient size. The contractor put on one of his rafts his Dearborn waggon, horse and provender—slipped his cable, and accompanied by jolly watermen, being himself a skilful pilot, ran his rafts, without the loss of a single stick, safely to the head of shallop navigation, in Chesapeake Bay. Here suitable vessels were furnished, the timber floated down the Chesapeake, up the Potomac, delivered at Washington city—the money paid for it—and the gentleman mounted his Dearborn returned home.

We learn that orders have been received from Washington to fit for sea the U. S. brig *Sparks*, now at the navy yard, Charlestown. She is supposed to be destined for the coast of Africa. The recent re-captures of the prizes made on the coast by the Alligators, seems to prove pretty conclusively that the assistance of larger vessels than schooners is demanded for the suppression of slave trading. One or two vessels of the size of the *Spark* will be found very useful.

THE BABES IN THE WOODS.

The following account is published in the Cahawba (Alabama) Press of the 13th inst. with assurance, that the authenticity may be relied on:

On the eleventh ult. two little sons of Mr. Henry Vinion of Butler county, one four, the other two years old, went out to meet their father on his return from work; took a wrong direction and got lost in an adjacent wood, which is entirely uninhabited. The inhabitants of Butler turned out en masse and after three days and nights diligent search, could not find nor hear the least account of them, and began to despair but still persevered. On the fourth day it was thought there was no less than two hundred engaged in the hunt. When about four miles from Mr. Vinion's house a voice was heard from one of the company that signs were found; which had scarcely died away before the cheering report was sounded by Mr. Sims that he had found the lost. To describe to you the scene is past my pen's communication. The lovely little babes were well, but much debilitated, however by a proper regimen, are restored to perfect health. They had taken up their abode near a refreshing brook and say they intended to live there, and the number of little beds found is indicative of the fact. Around their new abode was a number of sassafras bushes, from which they had gathered the leaves and barked the twigs and eat thereof, which was their only support. Surely a ruling providence was their protector and ought to be greatly adored.

THE LEGITIMATES.

An intelligent traveler from Europe, lately informed a military gentleman of this city, that Prussia continues to keep up a peace, establishment of four hundred thousand men; and that a neighbor the emperor of Austria, reposes under

The New Albany Cotton Manufactory, in this town, is in operation; they will shortly be able to Manufacture from 1000 to 1500 yards of cloth per week, and supply the country with what yarn will be called for. They have now eight looms in operation, which average from 18 to 24 yards per day each. We have seen some of their cloth which we think equals any we have ever seen that was manufactured in America. Dr. Joseph Whitcomb, has been appointed agent for the company, and has plenty of the cloth for sale at his store, much cheaper than imported. Thus; as Mr. Niles says, 'step by step we are getting up the ladder of Independence.'
