

len, public papers for some private purpose; at all events, he was the receiver of the stolen papers, and Gov. Jackson very justly considered him the same as the thief, and treated him accordingly.

The Spanish government had stolen property from us to the amount of five millions of dollars, and held it for fifteen years.

It is a matter of doubt whether our government acted right and justly towards our merchants by showing so much forbearance with the Spanish government, and permitted them to hold the stolen property so long, and even when the Floridas were ceded to us as compensation, the ex-governor Callava, attempted to defraud the rightful owners of property by stealing and carrying the papers from a public office.—Gov. Jackson, however, knew the Spanish character so well, that he was determined not to wait fifteen years for the recovery of the papers—he put Uncle Sams seal upon him and unsealed the fourteen Spanish seals which Callava had put upon the stolen papers. Callava wrapped himself up in his Spanish dignity but the Governor unrobed the Don, and made him appear in his true character, a public thief—a plunderer of a public office.—The long paper that Callava has published in his justification, needs only to be read to justify Gov. Jackson, Callava must have been a fool, as he certainly was as well as a knave, to suppose that he could hum-bug such a man as Gov. Jackson; he must be a stupid Spaniard or he would have known the character of Governor Jackson better. If it had been Ferdinand himself who had stolen the papers, he would have been treated the same; Jackson knows no distinction—it is the culprit and the crime he will always punish, KING or NO KING.

LATEST FROM EUROPE

DEATH OF THE QUEEN OF ENGLAND!

By the arrival of the ship Importer, at New York, on Saturday last, London papers have been received to the 3d containing but little news. But the Importer spoke on the coast the ship Panthea, which vessel sailed from Liverpool for New York on the 9th of August, and reports the death of the Queen of England; who died on the 7th of August.

The London New Price Current of August 1, states that the Coffee Market had been languid, but was improving.

The accounts of the vintage in France are contradictory, but generally unfavorable.—The prices of brandy are nominal.

Rice has risen in consequence of the advance in the price of corn, but few purchases had been made, as the holders will not sell.

The London Courier of the 2d ult. notices the illness of the Queen. She was then considered in a dangerous state.

The King of England had sailed from Portsmouth on his visit to Ireland.

It was currently reported, that a partial change would shortly take place in the Administration, and a coalition be formed between the leading members of the present government and the Grenville party.

A Madrid article of July 14, says, the intelligence of Bonaparte's death has reached this capital—it caused no sensation.

It is said that the Emperor Alexander has demanded complete satisfaction from the Porte, for the insults offered to his Ambassador, and that in the space of eight days. If it be not given, the Ambassador has received orders to quit Constantinople; and the Russian troops, assembled on the Pruth, will enter Moldavia.—All the Generals have received sealed orders, which they are not to open until a certain day.
