FROM HAVANA

By the schr Comet arrived yesterday, we have received Havana papers to the 15th inst. Very little notice is taken in them of some late disturbances in that city, but letters that we have seen and verbal accounts say, that a considerable alarm prevailed there early in December. It appears that on the second, preparations were making for an election of representatives from Havana to the Spanish Cortes, and that the natives of Old Spain, fearing that the Creoles would carry their candidates, gained over the troops of the garrison with the intent to fix the election in their favour by armed power. And thus secure the city for a time, but the Creoles without were not idle. They collected a large force and sent word to the governor that if an accommodation upon fair terms was not made, they would penetrate into the city and endeavour to gain their rights by force. This step had its expected influence; a conference was opened and the military having yielded to the civil authority, the elections went on without molestation, and the Creoles succeeded in carrying off their favourites.

The confusion lasted about four days during which all business in Havana was at a stand and very lively apprehensions were felt that tumult and bloodshed would ensue. Every thing soon resumed its wonted tranquillity after the return of the troops to their duty.

It is expected that examples will be made of some of the ringleaders of this plot against the rights of the people. Eighteen persons, most of them officers in the army, are to be tried and capital punishment of some of them is spoken of.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Charleston, to a Representative in Congress.

CHARLESTON, Dec. 23.

We have an arrival from Havana this morning, with accounts of commotion there, occasioned by a late election or appointment of deputies to the Cortes. It seems, the acting governor, having pursued a course contrary to the wishes of the European Spaniards, was about opposing them, when the Creoles of the country rose en masse. (report says 7000) and came down to the city, mounted and armed, when the other party relinquished their points. An attempt had been made by a party to possess themselves forcibly of a schooner fitted out for the coast of Africa, no doubt with a view of converting her into a pirate, but had been repulsed with some loss. One or two American vessels had also been robbed in the harbor. The English squadron were at anchor on the 10th instant, off Point Texas.

EMPEROR OF BRAZIL.

NORFOLK, Dec. 30.

We learn from captain Rudder, of the brigantine Decatur, who arrived here on Saturday from Rio Janeiro, which place he left on the 5th November, that the affairs of that country were in a very unsettled state at the time of his sailing. The badge of Independence or Death, which denoted the adherents to the new emperor, was not recognised with cordials by many of the inhabitants. New laws and edicts were daily promulgated, and many of those attached to the ancient order of things, were preparing to leave the country.

The Prime minister has resigned his office, and nearly all the other members of the cabinet had followed his example; but this measure having produced much clamor among their friends, all of them, with one exception, were prevailed upon to resume their official duties, upon a promise being made to them, that the laws for the punishment of traitors, should be rigidly enforced. This occurrence gave rise to a proclamation from the emperor, for purging the country of those hostile to his newly established government.

DON PEDRO was proclaimed Emperor of Brazil on the 12th October.
