#### From the Indiana Intelligencer.

On Saturday evening the sixteenth instant, the Jeffersonville State Prison was broken open, and Nine Convicts made their escape—the circumstances were as follows:—The Agent had been absent for a number of days, and the keepers were taken sick; the Prisoners, however, were all locked up in their cells as usual, with the exception of one man, by the name of Truxel, who was supposed to be unable to leave his bed in consequence of sickness, and was allowed to remain in one of the large rooms. In the night he broke open one of the cells and let out a man by the name of Alexander H. Perry, who broke open four other cells and let out James Johnson, Morris Loper, James Miller, Joseph Gray, and John Warram; James Robinson and Isaac Austin, (black men) all of whom made their escape by digging a hole through the wall under one of the windows.

A Crow-bar was found at the place, and it is supposed that it was furnished by some person from without, who knew the situation of the keepers.

All those who feel an interest in the welfare of society, it is ardently hoped, will keep a good look out for these convicts. Some of them no doubt will commit such thefts as opportunities may permit. Good horses will be considered a noble prize to men in such desperate circumstances, and undoubtedly will be obtained by some if not all of them.

Miller and Warram have been taken, and committed to jail in this place.

#### NOTES.

1. The Postmaster General may expedite the mails and alter the times for the arrival and departure at any time during the continuance of the contract, he paying an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.

2. Ten minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mail, at all offices where no particular time is specified.

3. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the times prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit five dollars; and if the delay continue until the departure of any depending mail, whereby the mails destined for such depending mail lose a trip, a forfeiture of double the amount allowed for carrying the mail one trip shall be incurred unless it shall be made to appear that the delay was occasioned by unavoidable accident; in which case the amount of pay for a trip, will, in all cases, be forfeited.

4. Persons making proposals are desired to state their prices by the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly—in the months of February, May, August, and November, one month after the expiration of each quarter.

5. No other than a free white person shall be employed to carry the mail.

6. Where the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals; and the stage must be of sufficient size to conveniently convey seven passengers.

7. The Postmaster General reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever one failure happens, which amounts to the loss of a trip.

8. The distances stated are such as have been communicated to this office, and some of them are doubtless incorrect: on this subject the contractor must inform himself.

9. The contracts are to be in operation on the first day of January next; and are to continue four years.
