

the affairs of Portugal, in which event she would be resisted by Great Britain. It was also rumored, that a French fleet had sailed, or was about to sail, to aid the Spaniards in regaining possession of the South American colonies. The meetings of the cabinet council had been of late very frequent and protracted, and a large increase had been made in the contract for provisions for the navy.

A London paper of July 23, says that ministers do not entertain the slightest apprehension of the occurrence of any circumstances which would impose on them the necessity of abandoning their present pacific policy. There are, no doubt, discussions now pending respecting South America, but it is expected they will terminate in an arrangement which all the powers will adopt, England as well as the holy alliance. If Hanoverians be sent to Portugal, they are to be on the usual footing of Swiss or German capitulation troops, and England is not to be in any manner responsible for the cost of them.

The surplus of British capital is, it is said, about to be applied to the support of British colonies instead of being sent to the assistance of those of other nations. A company is forming, under the immediate sanction of government, for the purchase of the lands which have hitherto been reserved by the crown when they located the lands of Canada. It is proposed to clear these lands in part, and let them on advantageous terms to settlers, or persons of small capital, who it is thought will thus be induced to go to Canada instead of the United States.

The Chamber of Commerce and Manufactures of Edinburgh, has petitioned his majesty in council to recognize the independence of the new states in South America and Mexico.

Calcutta Government Gazettes to the 11th of March, had been received in London, which furnish some particulars of the commencement of the war with the Burmese. It appears from the details given in the Calcutta papers, that the Burmese came down in great numbers, and attempted to secure possession of the country by erecting stockades to cover their positions, skillfully selecting the strongest and most advantageous grounds to plant their fortifications. They were, however driven from several of their positions by the force under lieutenant Col. Bowen. In a subsequent attack however the British were not so successful, and lost several officers and 150 Sepoys killed and wounded. The Burmese lost 500 men, and in a few days after the remainder voluntarily evacuated the stockades which they so gallantly defended. The British had by that time received reinforcements; and moved forward in pursuit.

Advices from Madrid were to the 14th July. M. d'Oubriel, minister from Russia, arrived there on the 10th, said to be the bearer of instructions which will establish perfect harmony between all the foreign ambassadors, on all the important questions to which the situation of Spain has given rise. It was expected the Spanish war and finance ministers would be immediately dismissed. A messenger had just reached London from Madrid, with important despatches.

Dispatches from Cape Coast to May 12th, had reached England. The Ashantees had pushed their successes nearly to the gardens, four miles from the castle, but no apprehensions were entertained of an attack. Some further reinforce-

ments were expected, when it was intended to give battle to the natives.

A letter from Prince Mavrocordato declares that the Greeks entertain no apprehensions of the Turks or the Viceroy of Egypt. The Prince speaks in consolatory terms of the prospects of the Greeks, from the advanced period of the season, and the returning good sense of the chiefs who had seceded from the government.

The accounts from all parts of the Morea are of the most consolatory description. All the dissensions seem ending in concord, and in a general re-organization.

A passenger in the schr. Dorathy, arrived at New Orleans, from Tampico, states that letters from Campeachy had been received there stating that the traitor Sautana, who had been sent by the Mexican government to take command of the province of Yucatan, had seceded from the Mexican union and had made an arrangement with the Spaniards by which the trade with Havana was again opened.
