

That application having failed, the congress of the republic very properly themselves loaned the money to their farmers. General Santander is again a candidate for vice president of the republic.— He has several rival candidates. J. J. Olmedo, a native of Guayaquil has been appointed minister plenipotentiary from the Peruvian republic to Great Britain.

The question has occurred, as to whether the military have a right to vote in the election of civil officers. The qualifications of voters in the constitution are 1st. to be a Colombian 2d to be married, or 21 years of age. 3d. to read and write. (this is not to be insisted on till the year 1840) 4th. to be master of a landed property of \$100, or to be in the exercise of any independent office or calling other than as a workman or servant. The question seems easily to be settled; for, if the soldier possesses the stated qualifications, he is entitled to vote.
