A Request.—It is requested that the Managers of Poor Houses and Penitentiaries, ascertain as nearly as they conveniently can, the proportionate number of paupers and convicts, whose poverty or crimes are occasioned, directly or indirectly, by the use of spirituous liquors, & publish the same in some newspaper annually.

And the committee on the judiciary was instructed to inquire into the expediency of a law for taxing retailers of spirituous liquors, in proportion to the quantities by them respectively sold.
