Joshua Weyth, who was one of the celebrated Tea Party, in Boston Harbour in 1773 and was afterwards at the battle of Bunker's Hill, now resides in Cincinnati, Ohio. He is in the 74th year of his age. He was made prisoner at Long Island, & was subsequently wounded at York Island. He is the father of 22 children; 18 of whom is living; & he has upwards of 50 grand children. With the fruits of his daily labour, and the assistance of a pension of 24 dollars per annum, he supports a family of his wife and five children.

New Hampshire.—In New-Hampshire, in 1810, there were but twelve manufacturing establishments, & the whole amount of woollen and cotton, flaxen and tow cloth manufactured by them, and by families throughout the State in that year, was only 4,274,185 yards. There are now in the State upwards of 50 cotton and woollen factories, which annually send out into the market about 30,000,000 of yards.

W. P. VAN NESS, judge of the U. S. District Court in the state of New York, died on the 6th ult. Judge Van Ness, was at Mr. Hoffman's upon an invitation to dine, and dropped down suddenly without any previous illness. He was in the 49th year of his age.
