Mr. Johnson of P. introduced a bill to provide for removing obstructions in the river Patoka. Mr. Richardson introduced a bill to amend the act relative to Revolutionary soldiers. Mr. Ferris introduced a bill to amend the several acts now in force regulating fees. The bill from the Senate, electing Prosecuting Attorneys by joint ballot, was read a third time and passed. Ayes 43 Noes 13.

A bill from the Senate amending the act supplemental to an act defining the duties of recorders, and pointing out the mode of conveying real estate, approved Feb. 12, 1826.

December 21.

Mr. Alley presented a bill to an horise Sheriffs to solemnize marriage, which was read the first time.

The engrossed bill making an appropriation to pay the debt due from the state to the United States and the engrossed bill declaring the Brushy fork of Muscatuck a public highway and for other purposes were severally read a third time and passed.

The engrossed bill declaring Salt creek a public highway was read a third time and passed.

December 22.

Mr. Johnston of K. presented the following for the consideration of the House:

Resolved, That the committee on canals and internal improvements, be and they are hereby requested to enquire into practicability of removing the natural obstructions, in the river Wabash, from its mouth to Terre-Haute, and should the same be considered of public benefit, in what manner and when the same should be attempted and carried into effect.

Mr. Hays moved to strike out "Terre-Haute," and insert "the mouth of Tippecanoe," which was carried in the affirmative, and the resolution was adopted by the House.

Mr. Beckes introduced a bill for the relief of master builders and mechanics.

Mr. Alley introduced a bill relative to taking up estrays.

The bill to authorise Sheriffs to solemnize marriage was read a second time, and motions to lay on the table, and indefinitely postpone the same, were decided in the negative, and the bill made the order of the day for to-morrow.

December 23.

Mr. Beckes from the committee of ways and means, to whom that subject had been referred, reported a bill to amend the act, for assessing and collecting the revenue, which was read a first time.

IN SENATE.

December 25.

Mr. Ewing from the committee of canals and internal improvements, reported a bill to provide for the improvement of that part of the river Wabash under the joint jurisdiction of Indiana and Illinois, which was read and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

December 26.

Mr. Clark from the select committee to whom the subject was referred, reported a bill providing for the more certain preservation of the evidence of titles to real estate, which was read the first time.

Mr. Ewing from the committee on Education, reported a bill amendatory to an act establishing county Seminaries, read, and an amendment being proposed by Mr. Rariden which was also read; and the whole was referred to a committee of the whole Senate and made the order of the day for to-morrow.

Mr. Montgomery reported a bill for the improvement of the navigation of the east fork of White Water river, which was read the first time.

Mr. Gregory introduced a bill to amend the act regulating the mode of doing county business, approved Jan. 11, 1824, which was read the first time.
