MR. STOUT—We have seen a communication in the Telegraph of last week, in relation to Post Offices, and intended as we believe, to implicate the Post Master at this place.

This is a matter of serious importance to us, and instead of darkly hinting at the misconduct of the Post Master here, or elsewhere, if Mr. Ewing would come out with the FACTS, he would act a much more manly part. The public at large, as well as the citizens of this county, are deeply interested in knowing whether—"wilful neglect, and a great degree of inattention" is to be attributed to the Post-Master here. Justice to him, and to the public at large, requires that an immediate statement of the FACTS should be made public. Let this be done before the first of August, otherwise we shall view it as a BASE and UNFOUNDED CALUMNY.

MANY CITIZENS OF DAVIES.

Mr. Rochester arrived at this place on Monday last, on his return from Mexico, which place he left on the 11th May. At that period the Congress of Nations had not convened. Indeed, from all we can learn, we are induced to believe that the administration must soon be satisfied that our ministers to Panama, or Tacubaya, had as well be recalled.—N. Y. paper.

A slip with which we were favoured from the New York Mercantile Advertiser, communicates the arrival at Boston, on Thursday, of the Cherub from Smyrna. She left at Milo, on the 16th of April, the Constitution frigate, from Smyrna, for

Mahon, to relieve the Ontario. The Ontario, after towing the Cherub back on the 28th of March, left her, to go in pursuit of the rest of her convoy.

The following is an extract of a letter by the Cherub, dated Smyrna, April 6:

"It is said a black flag was flying at Athens, which, if true, we may expect soon to hear of its fall. Lord Cochrane is in Greece, but as yet has taken no decided step. Want of time prevents my forwarding you a copy of all the latest news received from Greece."

Extract of a letter from Smyrna, March 27.

"I have no news to give you, except the arrival of Lord Cochrane in the Archipelago. The Greeks are getting on as usual, and the campaign looks as if it would be more decisive than former ones; and, from all appearances, Russia does not care much for the Greeks. She will never interfere to make them an independent state—at least this is the view I have always taken of the subject. The Turks are exerting themselves in getting ready a strong fleet, and sending off the new troops to the Morea. It is pretty well understood that the Porte will allow of the interference of no European powers. England alone has interfered in their behalf.

"Athens has been relieved by the Greeks, and some advantages gained.—General Karaskaki has gained a decisive victory over Omar Vrione Pacha, who is in a very bad situation. The Sultan has received a Tartar with this news. The frigate Hellas is at sea, with six hundred men, in company with a steam boat, and in company with some smaller vessels."

The free and sovereign state of Vera Cruz, by a decree of Congress, has prohibited Masonic institutions and all secret associations.

Nicaragua Canal.—The contract for opening this canal, which was to have been the medium of communication between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, has failed; the embarrassments of the Messrs. Palmers of New York, the original contractors, having disabled them from prosecuting the undertaking. A French Baron, it is said, is about to negotiate with the government for the opening of this canal.

The United States and Brazil.—From the following remark in the National Journal, we should be led to expect, that the executive is inclined to adopt an energetic course towards the Brazilian government, with regard to the recent indignities with which our merchants and our public agent have been treated. "It is presumed that the government are by this time in full possession of the facts; and if so, we doubt not that every disposition will be promptly manifested to obtain those explanations from the Court of Brazil, which the circumstances of the case may render it justifiable to demand."

We regret to learn, from the Savannah Republican, that a difference has arisen between the commissioners of the U. S. and the state of Georgia, in running the boundary between the latter and Florida, and that their further progress has been suspended by gov. Troup. Thos. Spalding, esq. commissioner on the part of Georgia, has returned to Darien, and Thomas Randolph, esq. commissioner on the part of the United S. to Milledgeville.
