

IN SENATE—February 20.

Mr. NOBLE presented resolutions of the Legislature of Indiana, instructing the Senators, and requesting the Representatives in congress from that state, to use their endeavors to procure the passage of a law appropriating a sufficient quantity of the public lands to enable the state to raise funds adequate to the construction of a permanent road, with suitable bridges and causeways, from Louisville, in Kentucky, through Indiana and Illinois, to St. Louis, in Missouri; and also to invite the co-operation of the senators and representatives of the states of Kentucky, Illinois and Missouri, to effect that object.

Referred to the select committee on Roads and Canals, and to be printed.

Mr. HENDRICKS presented resolutions of the legislature of Indiana, instructing the senators, and requesting the representatives of that state in congress, to use their exertions to procure the passage of a law to extend the time of payment on all lands now forfeited, or are liable to be forfeited, & to authorize each and every purchaser whose lands are either forfeited, or are liable to forfeiture, to redeem the same on making prompt payment therefor, at a price the amount of which, including forfeited payments, shall not exceed the minimum price of congress lands; and also the passage of a law giving to every purchaser & occupant of congress lands, who has made one or more payments, and whose lands have been forfeited or relinquished, or which are liable to be forfeited, a privilege in the nature of a right of pre-emption, for — years, to purchase the same, or other lands of equal value, at a sum, which, added to his former payments, shall make the amount per acre, not exceed the minimum price of congress lands; and that in the interim, and before the government has disposed of the same, every purchaser who has improved his lands, without completing the payments, shall have the privilege of occupying the same.

Referred to a committee on Public Lands, and to be printed.

Mr. HENDRICKS presented a resolution of the legislature of Indiana, instructing the senators, and requesting the representatives of that state in congress, to use every reasonable effort to restrain the importation of hemp, raw wool, and woollens, and to afford full and ample protection and encouragement to all articles of American growth & manufacture; and to give their united aid and co-operation to those states who encourage a national system of domestic manufactures and internal improvement.

Ordered, That so much of the resolution as relates to the encouragement of domestic manufactures be referred to the committee on Roads and Canals, and to be printed.

February 21.—Mr. NOBLE presented a joint resolution of the general assembly of the state of Indiana, instructing the senators and requesting the representatives of that state to use their exertions to procure from congress, for the use of the state of Indiana, duplicate copies of the Journals of both Houses, from 1789, to the commencement of the second session of the fifteenth congress; also the same number of copies of the Journals of the Convention of 1787, and of the State Papers, &c. printed by congress; and to procure the co-operation of all states hitherto admitted into the Union.—Referred to the Library committee, and ordered to be printed.

Public Lands.—The bill to graduate the price of Public Lands, to make donations to actual settlers, and to cede the refuse lands to the states in which they lie, for the purposes of Education and Internal Improvement, being under consideration, Mr. HENDRICKS offered the following as a substitute:

"That the public and unappropriated lands within the limits of the new states shall be, and the same and hereby, ceded & relinquished, in full property, to the several states in which they lie, on condition that such states shall not, at any time hereafter, put such lands into market at a lower minimum price, than shall be established by law for the sale of the public lands in the territories, and on condition that the Indian titles of lands within the limits of any state shall hereafter be extinguished at the expense of such state."

Mr. Hendricks accompanied his proposition with a speech of considerable length, & of able argument.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Pre-emption Rights.—Mr. JENNINGS from the committee on Public Lands, reported a bill giving the right of pre-emption in the purchase of land, to certain settlers, contiguous to the big St. Joseph's river, in the southern limits of the territory of Michigan, and in the northern limits of the state of Indiana; which was twice read, and committed to a committee of the whole house.

Great Fire at Havana.—The editor of the Charleston Mercury has been informed by Capt. Talbot, of the brig Miles Standish, that a dreadful fire had broken out on the night of the 9th February, in the village outside of Havana, which continued to burn until the next morning and by which about six hundred houses, exclusive of negro huts, had been destroyed. It was also ascertained that 11 persons had perished in the flames.

Singular Law case.—A singular suit has lately been decided in the Equity court of the 5th Circuit, New York. A man about fifteen years ago, disappeared from his family, and

on of suicide, and deposited his cloths, hat and pocket book in a boat upon a mill pond, adjacent to his residence, so as to induce a belief that he had actually destroyed himself.—The pond was dragged, but the body not found. The evidence of the death, however, was deemed so satisfactory, that administration was granted upon his estate, and part of his lands sold to pay his debts. But, a short time since, he re appeared, and forthwith, commenced ejectment suits against the purchasers of his property. The latter applied to the Equity court, to restrain him from proceeding, and a perpetual injunction has accordingly been granted.

1816—President: Monroe, 182, R. King, 84—Vice President: D. Tompkins, 113, opposition, scattering.

1820—President: Monroe, 213; no opposition, excepting one vote given from New Hampshire.—Vice President: Tompkins, 113, opposition divided.

1824—President: Andrew Jackson, 99, John Q. Adams, 84, William H. Crawford, 41, Henry Clay, 37.
