The letter further states that the people of Mexico are under the impression that they may outrage the flag of the United States with perfect impunity.

Borough Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE relative to the Ordinances in force within the Borough of Vincennes.

Sec. 1. BE it ordained by the Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, in Common Council assembled, That all Ordinances adopted prior to the 1st day of August, 1828, excepting only those herein after named, shall be, and the same are hereby repealed: *Provided nevertheless*, That if any person or persons shall have become subject to any fine, penalty or forfeiture; or prosecution, suit or action at law, for any fine or penalty, for misfeasance, nonfeasance, or breach of any of the ordinances by this ordinance repealed, then, and in that case, as to such fines, penalties, or forfeitures, prosecutions, suits, or actions at law, such ordinances shall remain in full force and virtue in law, any thing herein to the contrary notwithstanding.

Sec. 2. The following ordinances are excepted from the foregoing repeal, to wit:

No. 1. An ordinance adopting an establishing the plot of the survey of the Borough by Johnson & Emison. Passed 17th March, 1820

No. 2. An ordinance respecting the survey of Emison and Johnson, and the streets of the Borough. Passed, July 25th, 1823.

No. 3. A supplement to an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance respecting the survey of Emison and Johnson, and the streets of the Borough." Passed, August 8th, 1823.

No. 4. An ordinance directing the manner of surveying the common, and prescribing the time of sale. Passed, September 28th, 1818.

No. 5. An ordinance designating the time and mode of presenting claims to lots in the town of Vincennes, and the manner of deciding thereon. Passed, November 6th, 1818.

No. 6. An ordinance supplemental to an ordinance directing the manner of surveying the common, and prescribing the terms of sale. Passed, November 9th, 1818.

No. 7. An ordinance respecting the sale of lots in the common. Passed, July 23d, 1821.

No. 8. Supplement to an ordinance entitled "An ordinance designating the time and mode of presenting claims to lots in the town of Vincennes, and the manner of deciding thereon." Passed, August 10th, 1821.

No. 9. A resolution reviving an ordinance respecting the sale of lots in the commons. Passed, January 16th, 1822.

No. 10. A supplementary ordinance respecting the commons' lots. Passed, May 19th, 1823.

No. 11. An ordinance respecting the adjustment of titles to lots in this Borough, and for other purposes. Passed, Aug. 27th, 1823.

No. 12. An ordinance amendatory to the several ordinances respecting the sale of lots in the commons. Passed, Sept. 29th, 1826.

No. 13. An ordinance to continue in force "An ordinance respecting the sale of lots in the commons," passed 23d July, 1821, and to prolong the time of payment on commons' lots. Passed, November 18th, 1822.

No. 14. An ordinance entitled "An ordinance authorizing the purchase of Ladders and fire hooks, and directing house holders to provide fire buckets." Passed, April 9th, 1819.

No. 15. An ordinance supplementary to an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance authorizing the purchase of ladders and fire hooks, and directing house holders to furnish fire buckets," passed 19th February, 1825, and an amendment to the last ordinance. Passed, April 2d, 1825.

No. 16. An ordinance for licensing auctions within the Borough of Vincennes. Passed May 27th, 1820.

No. 17. An ordinance amendatory to the "ordinance for licensing auctions within the Borough of Vincennes." Passed, June 7th, 1826.

No. 18. An ordinance to amend certain ordinances now in force. Passed, June 25th, 1828.

LEXINGTON MARCH 10.
TO THE EDITOR.

Dear Sir: A most unprovoked and cold blooded assassination took place in this town late on yesterday evening. T. R. BENNING, Esq. the Editor of the Kentucky Gazette, was murdered in his own office, by CHARLES WICKLIFFE, son of Robert Wickliffe, Esq. He was secured, and taken by the officers last night at his father's house, brought before an examining court this day, and held to bail in the sum of \$6,000. Mr. Benning died about 6 o'clock this evening, having lingered in extreme agony about 24 hours, leaving a distressed and helpless family.

The circumstances which led to the perpetration of the foul deed, as appeared in evidence, are briefly these:

On Wednesday last there appeared in the

Kentucky Reporter a communication over the signature of "Coriolanus," speaking in the most extravagant terms of the virtues of Robert Wickliffe, and denouncing Mr. Benning as a "fiend," "vile wretch," &c. &c. It also contained vile insinuations against the character of two gentlemen, not therein named, but understood as applying to Messrs. — and —.

One of the individuals alluded to, came out in answer to "Coriolanus," in the last Gazette, over the signature of "Dentatus," in which he merely requested "Coriolanus," to avow himself—promising in that event to address him, (if worthy of notice,) over his ("Dentatus") real signature. On Monday, Mr. Charles Wickliffe, demanded the author of "Dentatus." Mr. Benning promised to comply with the demand at 5 o'clock, at which time Wickliffe arrived, with several pistols, and advanced to Benning, who was behind the counter—an altercation ensued, and Benning being totally unarmed, retreated to his back office, and whilst retreating, with his back towards Wickliffe, received the ball, which terminated his existence.

Great excitement prevails. The Adams and Clay men openly boast of the murder—while the Jackson men are determined that the murderer shall not escape the penalties of the law.

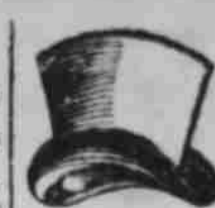
