The above is from the official returns, with the exception of Mississippi, which is taken from one of our exchange papers. We find the returns which we published of our own State were incorrectly added. By the returns of the Marshals it will be seen that we have about 20,000 less. If the ratio of representation is fixed at 50,000, we shall not gain another representative, as was expected. Pennsylvania will, however, retain her proportional number in the national councils, let the ratio be fixed at any number.

We have given below the following table, showing the political influence of each State in the national councils, according to the new census. Five slaves having the same weight of three free men, we have given the representative number opposite to each state, and the number of Senators and Representatives in Congress.

Latest from Venezuela.—From Captain Clark of the schooner Splendid, arrived yesterday in 21 days from Porto Cabello, we learn that a few days before he sailed, commissioners had arrived there from Bogota to propose a re-union of Venezuela with the republic of Colombia, or rather the consolidation of the whole under the government. General Paez preserved perfect tranquility throughout the country.

Borough Ordinance.

AN Ordinance respecting dogs running at large within the Borough of Vincennes.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Board of Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, that there are dogs running at large within this borough, affected with hydrophobia or canine madness, therefore

BE it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, That if any person within said Borough owning any dog or bitch, shall suffer the same to run at large within the space of thirty days after the promulgation of this ordinance, the person so offending shall forfeit and pay a fine of one dollar, to be recovered by action of debt before any Court having jurisdiction thereof.

Sec. 2. And be it further ordained, That from the promulgation of this Ordinance and thirty days thereafter, it shall be the duty of the Borough Constable and as many assistants as he may think necessary, and hereby permitted to any other person to kill all dogs found running at large within the Borough of Vincennes.

This Ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after one publication in the Vincennes Gazette, and Western Sun, any Ordinance or Resolution to the contrary notwithstanding.

BY THE PRESIDENT of the United States.

IN pursuance of law, I, ANDREW JACKSON, President of the United States of America, do hereby declare and make known, that public sales will be held at the undermentioned Land Offices, in the state of Indiana, at the periods designated, for the sale of the lands hereinafter mentioned, viz:

And at the Land Office at Jeffersonville, on the 1st Monday in August next,

For the disposal of such relinquished and reverted lands, within the present limits of those districts, not heretofore exposed to public sale, subsequently to their relinquishment or reversion to the United States, as shall not, prior to the fifth day of July next, have been paid for or redeemed, agreeably to the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved on the 31st day of March, 1830, entitled:
