Commercial Report.

FROM THE LOUISIANA ADVERTISER, OF APRIL 7, 1832.

GENERAL REMARKS.—The weather during the week has been rather squally and disagreeable for outdoor business; produce arrives more plentifully than last noticed; the Mississippi remains about four feet below high water mark.

COTTON.—Purchasers appear rather doubtful about the state of the European markets, and consequently defer operating at the present moment to any large extent; some small sales have occurred of North Alabama and Tennessee, at 10 a 10 cts, and some of Louisiana and Mississippi at 11 a 11 cts.

FLOUR.—Continues at our last quotation, \$5 50;—sales are generally made for the Havana and Florida markets. In the beginning of the week our prices had declined considerably, but on the receipt of information from Havana of the scarcity of flour in that place, prices advanced to our former quotation, and sales were effected at that price.

WHISKEY.—The market has been supplied this week by the arrival of 1550 bbls, which found ready sale at former prices, 37 a cts.

LARD.—Good leaf continues to improve in demand and price. We now quote an addition of 1 cent on last week's statement, and more scarce.

COFFEE.—No change in prices, for former quotations are continued, for Havana green, 13 a 14 cts, plenty on hand, and very little demand.

SUGAR.—Remains in good request, and prices continue firm and without change.

LIME.—Has not changed since our last.

EXTRA GLOBE.

It is these men only—men who would prefer war, famine & pestilence, or any other scourge, to their own exclusion from power, that are seeking to fill the country with complaints and factions.

It is the interest and desire of the people to preserve the administration of their government in honest hands. To effect this object, it is only necessary that they guard against deception, and take steps to procure correct information in relation to the administration. Borough Ordinances.

AN ORDINANCE respecting Tippling-Houses.

Enacted by the President and Board of Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, That retailers of spirituous liquors, foreign or domestic, by less quantities than one quart, or persons keeping tippling-houses within the borough, may procure license therefor as follows, to wit: On the payment of the sum of fifteen dollars per year, or in proportion thereto, for less time than one year, to the Borough Treasurer, who shall execute his receipt therefor to the applicant, who shall deliver the same to the President of the Board of Trustees, who shall thereupon give license accordingly, for the period paid for, to the applicant under his hand and seal.

Sec. 2. At each term of the Knox county Circuit Court, it shall be the duty of the President of the Board of Trustees, to report in writing to the grand jury, the names of retailers as aforesaid, having license, and also of those not having license.

Sec. 3. The amount of money arising from licenses as aforesaid, shall be kept apart and form the common school fund.

This ordinance to take effect from and after its publication.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Ordinances concerning the Market.

Enacted by the President and Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to buy or sell within the Borough of Vincennes, any article designed for sale in the market, after the hour of 4 o'clock, P. M. of the days preceding the regular market days, nor shall any grocery keeper or merchant either directly or indirectly, purchase any of the articles intended for market, during market hours, in greater quantities than may be really necessary for his or their own consumption, and that all persons offending by so buying or selling, shall be subject to the same penalty as for buying or selling out of the market during market hours.
