# NEW YORK GREETES DIRIGIBLE CREW

## SMITH IS VERY OPTIMISTIC OF ELECTION

FOR FIRST TIME DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE MAKES A DEFINITE ELECTION PREDICTION

EXPECTS OHIO AND PA. SUPPORT

If Governor Carries These Two Republican States Supporters Believe He Will Carry Country

SEDALIA, Mo., Oct. 16.—Three weeks from election day finds Governor Al Smith very confident of his own election.

From the outset of the campaign, the New York Governor has been exceedingly optimistic concerning his own chances. But on his present tour of the South and border states he has developed a degree of confidence that has surprised even his close associates.

For the first time today he ventured upon a definite election prediction. He said he expects to carry both Pennsylvania and Ohio. That is how confident he is. Pennsylvania's rock-Republicanism is traditional. No Democrat has ever carried it for the presidency; Ohio's record is almost as Republican. No Democrat, save Woodrow Wilson ever carried it nationally.

Yet in the face of the record, Governor Smith says he expects to get the electoral vote of both states three weeks from today. There is scarcely a practical politician in the country but who believes that if Governor Smith carries either state he will be elected.

The Governor's confidence of his ability to do what no other Democratic candidate for the presidency has ever done was reviewed almost casually during a press conference. He said he was going to speak in Pennsylvania before the campaign ends—Probably in Philadelphia but he doubted whether time would permit his going into Ohio.



## EMIL SNYDER LIQUOR TRIAL IS POSTPONED

CHIEF WITNESS OF PROSECUTION HAS DISAPPEARED—STATE CANNOT MAKE CASE UNLESS WITNESS IS APPREHENDED

Unable to successfully prosecute its case against Emil Snyder, Jefferson township man, charged with sale of liquor on the night of October 9 to Everett Alexander, because of the disappearance of Alexander, chief state witness, the state has continued indefinitely the date of Snyder's trial. Snyder was scheduled to go on trial Tuesday morning in the Putnam Circuit court.

The defendant was arrested Wednesday, October 10, on a warrant issued on an affidavit filed by Alexander charging that Snyder had sold him liquor. Snyder was arraigned and pleaded not guilty and was released under a \$500 bond, pending trial.

Fearing that Alexander would seek to evade appearing against Snyder the state filed an affidavit charging Alexander with the purchase of liquor in connection with his statements and affidavit against Snyder. When officers attempted to serve a warrant on Alexander he could not be found. This affidavit was more to arrest and hold Alexander under bond for Snyder's trial than to prosecute Alexander on a liquor charge, it was said.

BEDFORD, Ind., Oct. 15.—The public schools of Leesville, east of this city, have been closed on account of an epidemic of diphtheria. One child is reported to be in a critical condition and the disease is spreading rapidly.

## BODY OF SOUTH BEND WOMAN IS FOUND BY HUNTER

SKUNK BRINGS TWO TEETH TO SURFACE AND HUNTERS DIGS INTO HOLE TO UNCOVER BODY

IDENTIFIED AS MRS. STULTS

Bullet Holes in Body and Crushed Skull Indicate Foul Play—Wallet Near Body Contained \$200

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 16.—(INS)—A nation wide search for Harvey Smith, an Alabama detective who disappeared from South Bend a week ago was started by police here today following the questioning of three persons placed under technical arrest in connection with the mysterious slaying of Mrs. Ina Lee, 31, South Bend beauty shop proprietor whose body was found buried in Hme near Elkhart.

Police said they wished to question Smith regarding the case.

Those questioned by the police and held without charges but without bail were:

Charles L. Reyher, 40, well known South Bend real estate operator.

Mrs. Janie Reyher, 38, his wife.

Jack Kimball, 30, brother of Mrs. Reyher.

Police said that Mrs. Reyher told them she had paid Detective Smith \$50 to "get Mrs. Lee out of South Bend."

Mrs. Heyher explained, police said, she hired the private detective early last March after Mrs. Lee had developed an affection for Reyher.

"I couldn't stand to lose my husband and I conceived the idea of employing a detective to get that woman out of town," police said Mrs. Reyher told them.

Mrs. Reyher swore, police said, that there was no suggestion of harming Mrs. Lee.

Police authorities were continuing the grilling of Mrs. Reyher and of her husband and her brother.

Smith had an office in the Blackstone Theater Building here. He originally came here from Alabama but the authorities did not know the name of the town in that state from which he hailed. Smith dropped out of sight just a week ago.

ELKHART, Ind., Oct. 16.—(INS)—A skunk that burrowed into a lime pile in a thicket two miles southwest of here and dug out two human teeth today was credited by police here with being instrumental in solving the mysterious disappearance March 24, of Mrs. Ina Lee, 31, alias Mrs. Genevieve Stults, a South Bend beauty shop proprietor.

Ray Leroy Whalen, a hunter, saw the teeth and the hole and dug into the pile revealing the murdered body of Mrs. Lee.

The body lay only a short distance below the ground. There were two holes, apparently made by bullets, in the left breast and the back of the skull was crushed in as if by blows (Please Turn to Page 3)

## DARROW TAKES BLOW AT HOOVER

CHESTER, Pa., Oct. 13.—Clarence Darrow, world famous lawyer and radical left today after making one of the bitterest attacks of the presidential campaign on Herbert Hoover.

In a speech at a Democratic rally Thursday night, Darrow characterized Hoover's speeches as "soft and silly" and said that Hoover had been "flirting with the sob sisters" of the major political parties for the last 8 years in "an effort to gain the presidency."

"If Hoover was unaware of the Tea pot Dome scandal he is too dumb to be President," Darrow said.

Darrow said the G. O. P. prosperity slogan meant "prosperity for the prosperous and poverty for the poor."

## BIG ZEPPELIN SAFELY TUCKED IN BIG HANGAR

HUGE GERMAN DIRIGIBLE ARRIVES AT LAKEHURST AT 5:38 O'CLOCK MONDAY AFTERNOON

NEW YORK PREPARE RECEPTION

Demonstration Up Broadway Expected to Rival That Accorded Lindbergh On Return From Europe

NAVAL AIR STATION, LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 16.—With the Graf Zeppelin which brought them safely 6,300 miles over land and sea snugly tucked away in the hangar here Dr. Hugo Eckener and his companions on the epochal air voyage snatched a few hours of much needed sleep early today preparatory to departing for New York, where a great reception awaits them.

The long, silver-bodied dirigible, just arrived after a flight of almost five days, was towed into the hangar at 3 o'clock this morning. There she rested beside the Navy dirigible Los Angeles, the object of a glowing pride in the breasts of many who admired her. The Graf Zeppelin had landed here at 5:38 yesterday afternoon from Friedrichshafen, Germany and spent the intervening time moored to a mast half a mile from the hangar.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(INS)—New York city's millions pay homage today to the crew and passengers of the Graf Zeppelin, who dared the Atlantic in the first flight of an air liner from Europe to America. A monster parade, followed by an official reception and welcome at City Hall, are highlights of the program for greeting the hardy souls who made the 6,000 mile journey from Friedrichshafen, Germany, in the monarch of the skies.

According to revised plans announced by the mayor's committee on receptions to distinguished guests, the party will be brought from Jersey City this afternoon to Pier A on the municipal steamer Macom, and the parade from the Battery to the City Hall will start at 4 p. m.

The Macom's passengers will include Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible, passengers and members of the Zeppelin's crew, representatives of the army and navy, the German ambassador and staff, representatives of German societies, and members of the welcoming committee.

The demonstration for the fliers in the parade up Broadway is expected to rival that given Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh. The giant ship and her daring passengers have swept the city by storm.

Due to the absence of Mayor Walker, the city's formal welcome to the fliers will be extended at City Hall by Acting Mayor Joseph V. McKee. Proceedings will be broadcast by station WNYC.

A private dinner, presided over by Acting Mayor McKee, will be given for the fliers at 7 p. m. After dinner the visitors will attend a musical comedy and later a special showing of motion pictures of the Zeppelin's trip across the Atlantic.

Another round of entertainments awaits the fliers tomorrow.

OWNER OF CAR RESPONSIBLE FOR WAY IT IS DRIVEN





**TRESTER TALKS TO HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS HERE**

"SPORTSMANSHIP" IS TOPIC OF PERMANENT SECRETARY OF INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION — GILLEN ALSO SPEAKS

"Sportsmanship begins where the requirements of the rules end," said Arthur L. Trestler, permanent secretary of the Indiana High School Athletic Association in a chapel address on "Sportsmanship of the right type," before Greencastle high school students Tuesday morning.

**PICK COCHRANE AS BEST PLAYER IN AMER. LEAGUE**

CATCHER OF PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS WINS \$1,000 AWARD AS MOST VALUABLE PLAYER — HENRY MANUSH OF ST. LOUIS SECOND CHOICE

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Gordon Stanley Cochrane, catcher of the Philadelphia Athletics, today was named the most valuable player to his club in the American League.

Cochrane is 25 years old, a native of Bridgewater, Mass., and was purchased in 1924 by Connie Mack for \$50,000 from the Portland Club of the Pacific Coast League.

The selection was made by the league's commission of eight baseball writers, who gave Cochrane a total of 53 points. Henry Manush, St. Louis outfielder, was second choice with 51 points and Joseph Judge, Washington first baseman, and Tony Lazzeri, Yankee first baseman, tied for third place.

Willie Kamm, White Sox third baseman and Leon Goslin, Washington outfielders, were fourth and fifth in the selections. Injuries which handicapped Goslin and Lazzeri were regarded as working against them in consideration of the award, which carries with it \$1,000 in cash.

Four of the eight members of the commission placed Cochrane as first choice, while three made him second choice. One member did not vote for him at all, picking Jimmy Foxx as the Athletics' most valuable player. Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, New York stars, were not eligible for the award, having been previously honored.

**HEAD OF W. C. T. U. INDORSES DAILEY**

KOKOMO, Ind., Oct. 15.—Unqualified indorsement of Frank C. Dailey for Governor of Indiana, was given by Mrs. Elizabeth Stanley, Liberty, president of the Indiana Woman's Christian Temperance Union, at the closing session of the state convention here today.
