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### Infantile Paralysis Conquered.

A special from Boston, Mass., says: "Investigation at the Harvard Medical School, under the auspices of the State Board of Health, have resulted in such discoveries that the medical profession here is confident the time of final conquest of infantile paralysis is at hand. Dr. Philip A. E. Sheppard, special investigator of the board, who has given his entire time for four years to the study of this disease, has found the scourge is caused by a virus, instead of bacteria, as has been supposed. In the propagation and distribution of this virus dust plays an important part."

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
