

SUMMARY OF NEWS.

—Glad closed in New York, yesterday, at 67.

—D. C. Henderson, western agent of the Atlantic and Great Western Railway, died at Cincinnati on Monday.

—The Great Eastern Railroad train ran on the track near Logansport on Monday. The Strachan opera troupe on board, several of whom were injured.

—Secretary Browning has recovered from his recent illness, and is again at his post.

—An attempt was made to assassinate the freedom's bureau chief at Tazewell Court House, Virginia. The citizens held an indignation meeting.

—General Griffin has issued an address to the people of Texas, insisting upon the payment of that tax which he thought they were relieved by the military reconstruction bill.

—The citizens of Louisiana, now in charge, have prepared a long list of resolutions against Governor Wells, and petitioned the President for his removal.

—The New York Herald says the proposed Fenian raid upon Canada is taking a definite shape. A secret circular has been issued to all the circles calling them to arms.

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—A party of twenty-five citizens started from Kansas City, on Monday, in pursuit of the Richmond bank robbers. A portion of them approached the house of a man named Leaven, two and a half miles from Leavenworth, where they were met by a party of men, who were shot and mortally killed by Payne James, a notorious bushwhacker.

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—None of the Cabinet have signified their intention of accompanying the President on his North Carolina trip on Saturday next. He contemplates making it a quiet affair, and does not desire any public reception.

Report of the Investigating Committee.

Some weeks since, at a regular session of the city council, Mr. Brown asked leave to present certain papers which had been requested, to lay before that body. Leave was granted, and the chief clerk, Mr. Wood, immediately proceeded to select, strictly upon the conduct of August Richter, street commissioner. The clerk had read but a few lines, however, when a member, Mr. Sedgwick, arose and said that he could not read the papers before the council. The motion was opposed by certain members, who desired to have the charges read, but they were overruled. Mr. Wood then proceeded to read the table without reading the summary manner in which they were disposed of, and the indecent haste manifested by a portion of the council in its action, excited some curiosity on the part of the public, and a good deal of criticism was manifested among outsiders to ascertain the nature and extent of the charges against Mr. Richter. They came up again, and in such a way that they could not be suppressed. A committee was appointed, with authority to investigate Mr. Richter's conduct, and to report to the council.
