SHERIFF DUDLEY SAID TO HAVE KIDNAPED JAMES DILLARD.

Strong Charges Made by Illinois Citizens Against the Recalcitrant Sullivan Official.

SALE OF LAND UNDER WATER

AN ENTIRE ACRE BRINGS A PRICE OF \$40 AN INCH.

Suit Against a Theatrical Company—Accidents in the State—Big Telephone Mortgage Filed.

SULLIVAN, Ind., Nov. 26.—The citizens of Robinson, Ill., to which place Sheriff Dudley took the negro ravisher, James Dillard, last Thursday from Lawrenceville, advise that the negro objected to coming to Indiana without requisition papers, and that when the sheriff left that city with the negro it was for the alleged purpose of taking him to Marshall, Ill., to await legal process.

The Robinson Argus, in its issue today, says: "The sheriff, with three or four assistants, went to Lawrenceville, got the man, and on the morning train came to Robinson, where he (Dillard) was placed in jail with intent to take him to Sullivan."

When the time to go to the train arrived the prisoner declined to leave the State without requisition, claiming to be innocent of the charge laid against him. Some little time was spent in parleying and discussing the right of our sheriff to surrender him under the circumstances. Sheriff Huston declining to hold him, the Sullivan parties got a surrey and by force carried him away.

The Argus further says: "Governor Durbin has revoked the commission of Sheriff Dudley for allowing the prisoner to be taken away from him. This is in accord with a law passed by the Legislature of Indiana at its last session. The sheriff has appealed for an investigation and hopes to be reinstated in his office. It is probable some evidence might be had from our city. The protests of the prisoner against being taken without a requisition and the force used, as well as the treatment he received at the hands of persons not officers of the law, or of the sheriff's posse, and the fact that he would hardly be favorable to the sheriff. The Argus editor was not present when the man was removed, but from information which comes to us from a reliable source, is to the effect that it was an outrageous case of kidnaping."

STUCK BY A BICYCLE. Prominent Columbus, O., Woman Badly Hurt at Lafayette.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Nov. 26.—Mrs. A. D. Smith, of Columbus, O., who is the guest of her mother, Mrs. Ira L. Reeves, wife of Commandant Reeves, of Purdue University, was badly injured last night by being run down by a bicyclist at Columbus and Seventh streets. Mrs. Smith, who is an elderly woman, had attended a reception at the Lafayette Club, and accompanied by her daughter, was returning to her latter's home. The bicycle which struck her was ridden by a boy, and although he was thrown off, he was not hurt and rode off. The injured woman was taken to the Columbus hospital, where she is recovering from her wounds.

Sudden Death of a Wealthy Chicago Woman in W. R. C. Rooms. CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—Mrs. Sylvia Dotson, a well-known and wealthy club woman, has died of heart failure in the rooms of the Columbia Woman's Relief Corps in the Masonic Temple. Mrs. Dotson, who was seventy-two years of age, had been suffering from heart trouble for some time, and was making the annual inspection of the corps, had just saluted the American flag which draped the front of the platform at one end of the big hall and stood with her right arm extended to the salute when she collapsed. Her husband had been ill for some time, and she had just returned from his bedside, she reeled and dropper unconscious to the floor.

Physicians were summoned, but they failed to revive the unconscious woman. She died about two o'clock this morning. Mrs. Dotson spent large sums in charity in a private way. Her husband, Charles Dotson, was a prominent business man and one of the early residents of Chicago.

Other Deaths. COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 26.—Former State Treasurer William T. Cope, sixty-six years of age, died at his home here this morning as a result of a paralytic stroke, suffered last Friday. Mr. Cope was a former State representative and served in the legislature for several terms. He leaves a widow and two sons, Dr. Harry Cope, of Columbus, and Edward Cope, of Cincinnati.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Nov. 26.—Sheriff-elect James M. Fabusok of Pittsburg, Pa., died at the Egnew Hotel here to-day of heart failure. He was fifty years of age. His wife, Mrs. McBride, and Dr. J. M. McLaughlin, of Pittsburg, were with him when he died.

The unsettled condition of the foreign exchange market at the City of Mexico continues. The banks and private bankers are refusing any large business pending more definite information. There is no sign of a recovery in the market.

The National Zeitung of Berlin announces an agreement on the tariff bill. The bill was reached at a conference held at Chancellor von Buelow's residence Tuesday evening. The bill is expected to be passed by the Reichstag. It is said to provide for an increase of the government's revenue regarding the malt tax duty.

Sixteen batteries of quick-firing field guns, numbering ninety-six guns in all, have been ordered from the Krupp works at the commencement of the rearmament of the Turkish artillery. The War Ministry is also authorized to purchase 100 small caliber Mausers to complete the present establishment. With wagon and ammunition for the artillery, the orders entail an outlay of \$1,000,000.

A four million dollar steamship company has been organized at Copenhagen to establish regular service between that city and St. Thomas in the Danish West India Sea. The route will be fed by a number of smaller vessels, which will connect St. Thomas with points on the coast of Venezuela, Central America and Mexico. The company will also engage in commerce in these countries.

Justice Fitzgerald, in the Supreme Court of New York, yesterday issued an attachment of \$1,000,000 against the property in New York of the International Power Company. A New Jersey corporation, the attachment was in favor of John F. Plummer, a resident of New York, who is the International Power Company's agent in New York. He had recovered \$1,000,000 for breach of contract from the company through his efforts the American Locomotive Works Company was formed. He said he had endeavored to get the company to pay him \$1,000,000 for the work he had done and believed himself entitled to \$1,000,000 for services. A statement over the signature

of J. H. Hoadley was given out at the office of the International Power Company in which all the names of the directors and officers were listed. In Mr. Plummer's complaint were denied.

The committee of the Coal Miners' Federation of the Loire, France, held a meeting yesterday and decided to resume work at all the mines in the district. The possibility of the country having to provide more money for the development of the Transvaal, and also to abandon the general strike of the coal miners of France, which was declared on Oct. 9 and which at one time involved over 100,000 men, came to an end.

SIXTEEN-INCH GUN. It Is Over 4 Feet Long, and Required Over Four Years to Construct.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 26.—The sixteen-inch coast defense gun which was manufactured at the Watervliet arsenal was shipped to-day to the Sandy Hook proving ground and will reach there some time Friday. The gun was loaded on a barge which will carry it down the Hudson river. Under the direction of Colonel Farley, commandant at the arsenal, the gun was loaded on a specially constructed car weighing 220,000 pounds and slowly moved to the arsenal dock, where by means of an extra large crane and a mammoth derrick it was swung onto the barge.

Police officers are estimating that this weapon of coast defense: Length over all, 54 feet 2 1/2 inches; diameter at breech, 5 feet; weight, 16 inches; construction was begun May 14, 1898, and it was finished June 12, 1902. Some faint idea of its power can be obtained by the statement that it shoots a projectile weighing 2,750 pounds a distance of twenty-one miles. If smokeless powder is used it will travel 32 1/2 miles. It weighs 1,000 pounds of black powder. The crude steel from which the gun was assembled weighed 28,000 pounds. It is the largest machine in the world was built to handle a large amount of new machinery had to be made for the construction of the gun. The cost was so great that it is doubtful if any more of similar size will be built. When it was completed the government to construct about twenty sixteen-inch guns.

RENEWAL OF DISORDER. MORE TROUBLE AT HAVANA GROWING OUT OF THE STRIKE.

Motorman and Two Passengers Shot—Rural Guards Patroling Streets—Political Complications.

HAVANA, Nov. 26.—With the exception of the cigar makers, all classes of laborers returned to work this morning and business generally has resumed its normal conditions. The cigar makers still have a few minor points under discussion.

The authorities had begun to think that there was no fear of further disturbances, but these still remains a feeling of animosity in the hearts of some of the more demonstrative strikers against the motormen and car conductors, who are blamed for breaking up the general strike by their refusal to go out. Threats were made during the afternoon in outlying wards to do these men injury and these menaces culminated at dark this evening in an assault on several cars. The assailants, who were housed in Belascoain street and a motorman and two passengers were shot, the motorman being fatally injured.

All the rural guards, with the exception of those in the Columbia district, were summoned to duty in Havana. The streets through which cars are running are patrolled by the guards and two companies of artillery are stationed in the arsenal and treasury buildings ready to assist the police, though it is not thought that there will be any further disorders. The mayor's edict preventing the gathering of groups in the streets is still in force.

TRUE TO DEAD FRIEND. REMARKABLE TRIBUTE BY THE KAISER TO HERR KRUPP.

Federal of the Gun Maker Attended by His Majesty as a Rebuttle to the Deceased's Malingerers.

EXCORIATION OF AN EDITOR. WHO SLANDERED KRUPP IN THE SOCIALIST VORWAERTS.

His Writings Denounced as Shameful—Address to Workmen at the Funeral.

ESSEN, Prussia, Nov. 26.—The funeral of Herr Krupp, the great gun maker, was held here to-day. Emperor William was present. His attendance was designed by his Majesty to show his absolute disbelief of the accusations that caused the gun manufacturer's death. A statement was issued that the Emperor was indignant at the cruelty and malice of the Social Democratic charges and he is said to have personally expressed his feeling in the matter to a well-known personage. About 2,000 of the Krupp workmen were drawn up on either side of the route taken by the funeral procession. Prince Henry of Prussia was represented by Commander Schmidt von Schwidde.

Liviered servants bore behind the hearse on velvet cushions, the orders conferred on Herr Krupp by sovereigns all over the world. The city was in a black and the street lamps were lighted and hooded with crepe. At the cemetery as the coffin was lowered into the vault beside that of the deceased's father, Emperor William saluted and a great chorus of workmen's singing societies chanted a requiem. Then followed two funeral orations.

One end of the cottage of the deceased's father, whose body was laid in state, was reserved in order to admit the large metallic coffin. Flowers in great profusion were piled around. At the end of the coffin was Emperor William's wreath of orchids, violets and palms.

Before departing for Berlin the Emperor addressed the directors of the Krupp works and a deputation of the workmen at the railway station. His Majesty said: "I feel I must express to you how deeply I am affected by the death of Herr Krupp. The Emperor sends to all an expression of the same sorrow and she has already expressed her feelings to Frau Krupp in writing.
