John Snow, sixty-eight years old, of Charles County, was killed by a runaway horse, and his wife, seventy-eight, is recent death in Jackson county.

To hear of the absorption of the Edison Telegraph Company by the Western Union, the Postal Telegraph Company will extend its lines from Auburn to Ft. Wayne.

Daniel Ford of Elkhart, caught his arm between two top-wheels, and was killed by the muscle from the elbow to the shoulder and torn and ground into mince meat.
