There are forty-nine steam engines now in operation under this roof, three by air compressors, seven Worthington circulatory pumps, and nobody knows how many electric dynamos—they are beyond computation.

Three Thousand Horse Power. This is the engine of the Allis type, 26, 40, 60 and 70,77 inches, of 2,000-3,000 horse power. It is a quadruple condensing engine; it uses the steam four times before it has a chance to get away. So there are four cylinders. The smallest one is 26 inches in diameter, and in its square box looks as big as a young cable car. The biggest one has a bore of 70 inches—that is nearly six feet. A good-sized man could stand upright in this cylinder. There is more room inside than in the average high-priced chamber at a World's Fair hotel. These cylinders are set in pairs, one on either side of the space for the fly-wheel. The smallest one takes the steam through a pipe of eight inches inside diameter, the others through pipes of twelve, sixteen and twenty inches, and the steam finally gets away through a twenty-two inch exhaust pipe. There is a 30x10-inch air pump beneath this engine. The power of the thing is declared to be nearly double that of which the Corliss engine, for at the strain to which the condenser is subjected, it is to produce 1,400 horse-power this one will develop 3,500.

It is the big wheel of this Allis engine that compels most admiration. This wheel is lying in scraps and bits around the floor now. Each scrap weighs about two tons. The shaft was being rolled in place yesterday. It had to be tugged along the floor, for the great electric traveling crane that runs overhead will only carry twenty tons, and the shaft will weigh thirty-six tons. This shaft is seventeen inches in diameter at its small end and twenty-one inches in diameter at its large end. It is to be built in a thirty-foot wheel, which shall have a face of twenty-eight inches. That makes over a wheel. It is to carry a belt which will drive a gang of dynamos of 20,000 light capacity.

An apartment has been arranged for the carriage of small instruments which can be used in ordinary emergencies. REAL-ESTATE TRANSFERS.

INDICATIONS THAT THE SPRING BUSINESS HAS FAIRLY BEGUN. Much Building in the City, and an Increasing Demand For Inside Property—Street Improvements—Property in the Additions.

The condition of the real-estate market has been encouraging to dealers during the last week, and judging by the number of transfers recorded, there are undoubted indications that at last the season has really opened and the spring business has begun. In the city proper the amount of building going on is large, and there is an increasing demand for inside improved property for business purposes. There are few transfers of lots in the business part of town, but there is a growing demand for houses in good location ready for business. There appears to be no doubt that outside capital is looking in this direction for investment, and could be readily induced to stay here, but holders of choice lots are not inclined to sell at a price upon their holdings, and an option on any really good property is almost impossible to obtain. Some inquiries have been made recently by non-residents with a view to the purchase of the When Block, but the price demanded was prohibitive and negotiations were broken off. A number of fine buildings are in prospect, among them the Hendricks business building on New York street, the Schaff Block on Market street, the Cordova on Washington street.

LETHARGY AMONG OWNERS. There appears to be a curious lethargy among the wealthy realty owners of this city, and although they would be indignant if accused of doing anything to retard the growth of the city, they certainly look with an unfavorable eye upon any proposed improvements that would be likely to deprive their particular property "in the shade," and perhaps depreciate its value. This feeling has a discouraging influence upon men who have enterprise enough to risk what they have in their belief in the future of Indianapolis as a city, and unless this feeling is concealed or overcome in some manner, a number of important transactions that are now in prospect, and which, if carried out, would work wonders for the prosperity of the city, will probably have to be abandoned.

IMPROVEMENT IN THE STREETS WHICH IS GOING ON IN MANY PARTS OF THE CITY HAS A FAVORABLE INFLUENCE ON THE PRICE OF REALTY PROPERTY, AND THE TRANSFER RECORD MAY BE EXPECTED TO GROW HEAVIER AS THE SEASON ADVANCES. The South Side appears to have awakened also, and a number of lots were sold last week in the south and southwest part of the city. There is some elegant residence property in this direction, and when rapid transit to that quarter is positively assured it will be more easily accessible than property equally as good on the North Side.

PROPERTY IN THE ADDITIONS. Property in the various additions is beginning to move off with some life, and a number of lots were disposed of last week. In Jackson Park, Reagan Park and Morton Park most of the best lots have been taken, but the others are now being picked up rather fast. Grand View, the addition immediately north of Reagan Park, is receiving a great deal of attention recently, and the house that is being built there for W. P. Wasson is no doubt having a beneficial influence. In the eastern part of the city a number of fine business houses are being erected, and the various additions seem to be doing a little business. Closer to Irvington a number of Indianapolis business men are building substantial houses, and this, combined with the better street facilities, will no doubt have a beneficial effect upon the property. Ira J. Childs is contemplating building a house in this locality, and a fine stone building is nearly ready for occupancy. The factory in the western part of the city seems to be growing. It appears at present, the outlook is bright for a successful season in real estate. APPELLATE COURT. Abstracts of Cases Decided Thursday, April 13, 1893.

NEW TRIAL—EVIDENCE—INSTRUCTIONS—PRACTICE.

688. Robert H. Rees vs. Samuel H. Black. Marion C. C. Affirmed. Ross J. (1) Before a ruling of the trial court in admitting or excluding offered evidence can be presented as error in this court, it must first be assigned as a reason for a new trial, and the assignment must be made before the trial court. (2) Where there is a joint assignment, error in giving numerous instructions, if one is correct the assignment of error is not available. (3) It is not a sufficient reason for a new trial that the defendant party forgot to testify to certain facts necessary to his case, on account of having a bilious headache while on the witness stand.

ACCIDENT INSURANCE—PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS—POSITIVE.

749. Jerome Landis vs. Standard Accident and Life Insurance Company. Eikhart C. C. Affirmed. Davis, J. Where appellant gave to appellee an order on his employer, a railroad company, for the payment of stipulated amounts at four stated times out of his monthly wages, as premiums on four separate accident insurance contracts covering certain periods, and the application and policy contained a stipulation that the insured should make no claim for injury received during any period for which the premiums had not been made, the order was not an assignment of the wages to become due, and not of itself a payment of the premiums; and where appellant drew all of his wages, leaving nothing to pay the order, which was not paid, he could not recover on the policy.

NEGLIGENCE—COUNTY BRIDGE—PLEADING.

867. Board of Commissioners of Shelby county vs. J. C. Foster. Johnson C. C. Affirmed. Lotz, J. It is the duty of the Board of Commissioners to build and keep in repair bridges over public highways over natural watercourses, and if the board fails to keep such a bridge in a reasonable state of repair, and the traveler is injured thereby, he is entitled to recover damages therefrom. The board is charged by law with the duty of constructing and maintaining.
