# Negroes to Get Top Administrative Jobs

## Boswell Expected to Reveal Choices For Board Appointments Next Week

For the first time in the history of Indianapolis, a Negro will be appointed to a major city board. Mayor Charles Boswell is expected to announce early next week his choice to fill a vacancy on one of the boards.

The revelation was made at a recent conference between the recently re-elected mayor and a delegation from the Federation of Associated Clubs. Starting W. James, FAC president, presented a list of requests, among them a petition that a Negro be appointed to the Board of Safety, Park Board or Board of Works. Mayor Boswell revealed that he "has a person in mind for one of the three boards, but I can't tip my hand."

James, speaking in behalf of the group, pointed out frequent reports of police brutality and a desire to have either Negro officers or interracial squads patrolling Negro areas as evidence of the need for having a Negro on the Safety Board.

OTHER REQUESTS included integration of the Fire Department, already scheduled to start Jan. 1; appointment of a Negro to the Redevelopment Commission and passage of anti-discrimination legislation.

Since the announcement of integration of the Fire Department, Mayor Boswell said, he has received a barrage of protesting letters. "Some of them," he revealed, "suggested another all-Negro station. I told them that wasn't what I had in mind."

"I haven't even bothered to answer most of them," he went on. "Usually, I try to answer all letters coming to my office, but these letters from bigots I simply ignore."

"I didn't campaign on integration of the Fire Department. To me, it's just a matter of morality."

He said he had talked with his choice — a Negro — for a post on the Redevelopment Commission and is almost certain the appointment will be made soon. He asked, however, that The Recorder withhold the man's name until the announcement is official.

"I feel that the Negro population ought to be represented on the board," he asserted. "In the past, it has been very easy to get zoning variances for business in Negro residential areas but difficult in white neighborhoods; a Negro on the board would help."

When Brown appeared in Municipal Court Room 4, Monday, Mrs. May wanted to drop the charges; she was charged with grand larceny, but the prosecutor refused to nolle the charge because she had already signed the affidavit and because Brown has a record of several previous arrests including pre-larceny.

Under the law the prosecutor's office has seven days to act on the affidavit. The case was continued and Brown was released after bondsmen. Sewell Davidson signed his \$250 bond.

## RACE ANGLE DENIED IN FIRING OF TWO JUVENILE WORKERS

Rumors of a possible "race angle" in the recent firing of two Juvenile Center employees were categorically denied Wednesday by Virgil Brand, director of the center.

A report that four Negroes had been fired on Monday of last week sparked suspicion that race might have been involved. According to Brand, however, only two workers — both assistant boys supervisors — were released, one for excessive absenteeism and the other for insubordination and failure to carry out the center's policies.

BOTH HAVE BEEN replaced by Negroes. As evidence of his lack of racial bias, Mr. Brand pointed to the fact that since he assumed direction of the center in June, 34 Negroes have been hired as against 13 whites. Four of each race, he said, have been released.

Of the four whites he dismissed, two were replaced by Negro workers. "Firing an employee is the toughest part of my job here," Mr. Brand told a Recorder reporter. "But in this case I had no choice."

None of the released men was available for comment.

# Dec. 29 Election to Decide Presidency of Local NAACP

## Ramsey Loyalty, Experience Cited By Supporters

A member of the board of the Indianapolis branch NAACP has gone on record as urging the election of Recorder Columnist Andrew W. Ramsey, candidate for the presidency of the local branch.

In a statement issued to The Recorder this week, Ernest Dix pointed out some of the achievements of the civil rights body during the 25 years of Ramsey's active membership.

Some persons, Dix said, are under the mistaken impression that the Indianapolis branch is doing more at the present time than in the past. "THE BRANCH TODAY has 2,000 members," he said. "Under Lowell Trice, Wilson Head, W. T. Ray and Mrs. Jessie Jacobs, the branch had 3,000 members and more. The branch has won national recognition for its work and for its membership activity."

## Jailed Ex-Cop 'Not Guilty' Again

Municipal Court Room 4 Judge Ernie S. Burke sustained a defense motion and dismissed charges of keeping a dive and violation of the 1935 Beverage Act against controversial Jacques W. Durham, proprietor of the Ebony Missile Room, 518 N. West.

Durham's attorney, George R. Browley, contended the evidence presented by the prosecution was obtained illegally.

The ex-policeman, who has a long record of arrests and only one conviction (the conviction is being appealed) was jailed along with an employee and four patrons Nov. 11. One of the patrons, Mieczyslaw Szyroka, 38, 1224 E. Tabor, was said to have reported he bought illicit liquor in the Missile Room and Hartwell Bonner, the club manager offered to get him a girl for \$25.

## Rev. Burton Has Backing of Ministers Group

The nominating committee of the local NAACP branch has named for president Rev. H. L. Burton, pastor of Phillips Temple CME Church.

Rev. Burton is in his sixth year as pastor of the historic church and has been a member of the Indianapolis NAACP for six years, serving on committees, participating in various programs and lending the use of his church, without cost, for special NAACP services and drives.

He recently received a certificate of award from the branch for his services. An NAACP worker for 12 years before he came to Indianapolis, Rev. Burton has served as president of ministerial alliances here and in Washington, D. C. was formerly principal of a junior high school in South Carolina and has held pastorates in North and South Carolina and in Washington, where he was pastor of First CME Church for nine years.

## PROPOSE 5-1-1 AFRICAN COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

DAR-ES-SALAAM, Tanganyika (ANP) — What has been labelled a "dramatic proposal which will have a sensational effect on the political development of all East Africa," was proposed by Sir Richard Turnbull, governor of Tanganyika last week. being an NAACP member and being an ACTIVE NAACP member," Dix continued. "Ramsey has been active continually and worked hard for the past 25 years. I know because I have had the pleasure of working with him all of this time. I know what he stands for, and for a man in his position he has suffered many kinds of humiliations."

"Show me one other Negro in the same position who has stuck his neck out to fight for civil rights as he has done," the board member challenged.

He emphasized Ramsey's column, "The Voice from the Gallery" (a weekly Recorder feature), in which he has encouraged NAACP memberships while speaking out for human rights and justice.

"LET'S GET WISE to ourselves," Dix admonished, "and stop throwing our courageous leaders to the wolves. Let's back them instead and prove to them that we are loyal to what they stand for."

"Ramsey deals with both races, and he knows the civil rights laws of this state and is qualified to lead the branch in its fight for first-class citizenship. He has been an officer in his church for 20 years and at present is chairman of the official board of Second Christian Church. But not only has he been a Christian in his church; he is a Christian in his everyday living, trying to fight for freedom, self-respect and dignity for every Negro in Indianapolis."

"I am sorry that some of the ministers have taken the position they have taken without hearing both sides of this un-called-for controversy to endorse any person until all of the facts have been considered."

He called upon NAACP members to "save the branch for those who have kept it alive all these years." Some of the newer members, he said, do not understand all of the hardships the veteran members of this branch have gone through. "We need all of the people, both old and new, to work together to help solve our problems," he concluded.

the board should help balance the situation."

The mayor pointed out that the state already has an anti-bias statute but suggested that the committee talk with members of the City Council about implementation or strengthening of the law.

"OUR MAIN PROBLEM has been with the courts," he told the delegation. "It's the same thing where vice is concerned. We arrest a person either for vice or for discriminatory practices and the case gets thrown out of court or the offender gets off with a light fine."

"Give a man 30 days, and anyone will quit discrimination," he said. Before the conference concluded, Mayor Boswell asked the FAC group to suggest a person to fill a vacancy on the Mayor's Human Rights Commission.

Also present at the meeting were Chester Little and Mesdames Mar Alexander, Hattie Davis and Dorothy Wilson of the FAC group and Bill Raspberry of The Recorder.

The Postal Alliance Auxiliary will meet Sunday at the Federated Club Home and install new officers for the coming year.

John Ray, president of the postal alliance, will assist in the installation.

### Social Security Tax Hikes Scheduled

Starting with your first pay check next year, 1960 social security tax will be three percent of the income, the Social Security Administration reports. This is an increase of one half of one percent over the amount now being deducted from each pay.

The amount of the employer's contribution will also be increased from two-and-one-half percent to three percent. The self-employed, those who work for themselves, will pay three-and-three-fourth percent on their net income for 1959; this rate will increase to four-and-one-half percent on their earnings for 1960.

These increases were scheduled by Congress in 1958 in order to preserve the financial soundness of the social security program. Other increases are scheduled in 1963, 1966, and 1969, at which time the contribution rates are to level off.

### Nashville Desegregation Plan 'Approved' By Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The year-by-year school desegregation plan initiated by the Nashville, Tenn., school board, has, in effect, received the nod from the United States Supreme Court.

The district court's approval of the plan was allowed to stand when the high court refused Monday to review the appeal. While the justices agreed that the district court retained jurisdiction of the action during transition, three members of the high tribunal contended that they should hear arguments on the constitutional validity of the plan.

**THE THREE DISSENTERS:** Chief Justice Earl Warren and Associate Justices Douglas and Brennan were specifically concerned with the constitutionality of that provision of the plan which stated that it "explicitly recognized race as an absolute ground for the transfer of students between schools, thereby perpetuating rather than limiting racial discrimination."

The 6-3 denial of the petition for a writ of certiorari legalized the Nashville school board's plan to commence desegregation in the first grade of the public schools and proceed by the desegregation of one additional grade a year until all grades have been finally desegregated.

A group of upper-grade Negro children maintained that the school officials' plan deprives them of the rights conferred by the due process and equal protection clauses of the 14th Amendment.

While the judgement of the court permitted some desegregation for Negro children in years to come, it effectively denied upper classmen any enjoyment, present or future, of their rights as recognized by the Supreme Court's 1954 desegregation decision.

### Alabama Cleric Wins in Appeal Of Boycott Case

BIRMINGHAM (AP)—A Birmingham Negro minister, sentenced to six months in jail under an obsolete state anti-boycott law for preaching against segregation, has won an appeal from the Alabama Court of Appeals.

Rev. Calvin W. Woods was freed by Judge Aubrey M. Cates Jr. because the anti-boycott law was repealed seven years before the alleged offense took place.

The 26-year-old minister was arrested in November, 1958, on a complaint that he urged church members to boycott city buses because of segregated seating. He openly admitted he preached about segregation but denied he urged the boycott.

AT THE TIME of the occurrence, Birmingham buses were segregated by city law. The ordinance has since been declared unconstitutional in federal court. However, the segregated seating arrangement continued under a company rule enabling drivers to seat patrons.

In addition to the jail sentence, Rev. Woods was fined \$500. He had been free under a \$1,000 appeal bond.

**FHA Strengthens Anti-Bias Stand**

NEW YORK — A new policy directive sent to all field offices of the Federal Housing Administration banning discrimination in the sale of properties acquired by the FHA "reflects a positive step taken by this agency in response to NAACP demands," Jack E. Wood, NAACP special assistant for housing, said here last week.

The directive, released in Washington, is the first of its kind to be issued by the FHA in the area of intergroup relations. Mr. Wood pointed out. "It re-affirms the agency policy of non-discrimination and re-asserts the right of access by all eligible families to foreclosed properties."

FURTHER, the Washington memorandum, sent out over the name of C. E. Sweet, deputy commissioner, calls upon every field office director to "make available all facilities of his office and staff for the direct reception, consideration and processing of offers without distinction as to race, creed or color whenever, in the opinion of the director, such facilities are required to assure compliance with this established policy of non-discrimination, even though such direct handling may necessitate payment of a commission under an outstanding contract or agreement, or may occasion consideration of the desirability of terminating an existing broker arrangement."

Negro citizens have complained that they have not had an opportunity to purchase or rent FHA-insured properties which, due to foreclosure, have reverted to federal possession. These properties have usually been handled by brokers who have not made them available to Negroes.

## Real Estate Agents Must Show Homes To Negro Buyers

BOSTON (AP)—Real estate agents in Massachusetts must show homes to prospective Negro buyers, according to a recent ruling by the state's attorney general. Edward J. McCormack Jr. found the legal basis for his ruling under the terms of the state Public Accommodations Law, administered by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination which had sought the ruling.

Under that law, expressly prohibited is discrimination by "any place, which is open to and accepts or solicits the patronage of the general public."

According to MCAD officials, the ruling became necessary after two real estate agencies refused to show property to prospective Negro buyers on the grounds that the property in question was not covered under the terms of the recently passed housing law.

Atty. Gen. McCormack cited a 1955 ruling by the Commission on Civil Rights in which a real estate agent was adjudged covered under the definition of a place of public accommodation. He further indicated that in the four years since then there had been no legal challenge to it in Connecticut.

Mrs. Mildred H. Mahoney, chairman of MCAD, has revealed that, as a direct result of McCormack's ruling, the commission will accept complaints from citizens of the state who allege that they have been denied equal treatment because of the race, creed or color by a real estate agent.

Each was held on charges of inflicting injury in the commission of a robbery, which carries a maximum sentence of life, and robbery, which carried a 10-25 year sentence.

Police say the three, and four other teenagers also were involved in the holdup of three Wake Up service stations, three bus robberies, another strong-arm robbery in the Marott Hotel parking lot and two vehicle thefts.







## Fined \$10, Costs

A young father who told a recent NAACP meeting of alleged police brutality against him was fined \$10 and costs on a disorderly conduct charge on Friday of last week.

Spencer L. Brooks, 2813 Eastern, was also charged with obstructing traffic and carrying a concealed weapon. However, he in turn charged police officers cursed him and one of them hit him in the face while he was handcuffed in a police car.

He was found not guilty of the concealed weapon charge, and judgment was withheld on the obstructing count.

A quiet-spoken, well-mannered young man, Brooks said he had never been arrested before and the whole thing came as a shocking surprise to him.

ABOUT 2:30 THE morning of Sunday, Nov. 29, Brooks related, he was driving south on Northwestern avenue between 26th and 25th when a car in front of him stopped abruptly without a signal. He said this car was occupied by a number of boisterous persons.

Brooks swerved left around the car to pass it, he continued. Almost immediately he was halted by two police officers.

"They cursed me, handcuffed and searched me, and shoved me into the squad car," Brooks related. "I sat forward because the handcuffs were hurting, and one of them hit me in the face with his fist."

"Some witnesses had gathered, and I tried to arrange for my brother to come and get the car. But the officers wouldn't let me. They said the car would have to be towed in—which I couldn't afford."

The young man said the officers confiscated a small knife which he had in his pocket.

FOR SOME REASON he was transferred to a second police car, which took him to jail where he remained till Monday morning.

Emily Post would never condone a guest at a birthday party whooping it up and having a grand time while forgetting to give the guest of honor so much as a "Happy birthday!" But that is almost precisely what we do each year at the greatest of all birthday celebrations — Christmas, the birthday of Jesus Christ.

How indulgently must our Savior smile as we flit about, performing the secular rites of the holiday season — buying cards for people who never would have crossed our minds had they not just sent us cards, decorating trees with trinkets whose symbolism we've long since forgotten, consuming enough liquor to preserve our internal workings until next holiday season and buying more and larger gifts than we can afford, with the lurking hope that our friends will be at least equally uneconomical where we are concerned.

How lonely must He feel to find Himself, Whose birth we purport to celebrate, almost completely neglected by His self-centered guests. How fervently must He hope that someone among those guests will take time out from his frivolity to wish Him a happy birthday.

If our problem is that we don't really know how He would have us celebrate, what kind of gift He would expect from us, we suspect He would be quite happy if we simply joined in the spirit of His birthday by re-dedicating our lives to Him — by making the annual Christmas observance an occasion for our being born again to the principles for which He came into the world, by sharing our abundance with the poor whom we have with us always, by conducting our celebration in such a manner that Christ would not feel Himself an unwelcome Guest.

Probably no phrase is more worthy of our earnest consideration (or falls on more deaf ears) than the shop-worn admonition, "Let's put CHRIST back into CHRISTMAS."

A spirited campaign is under way for the presidency of the local NAACP branch. And, despite the fact that two good men are running, rumors of a probable split by the losing faction have been rather too persistent to ignore.

The high degree of competition for a post which will require a great deal of time, work and sacrifice by the winner is a good indication of the enthusiasm of the members. If the NAACP is to continue its formidable task of eliminating segregation and second-class citizenship, that kind of enthusiasm is necessary. It is, however, equally necessary that the organization continue to present a united front in this struggle, regardless of who wins in the Dec. 29 elections.

Perhaps the holiday season, with its yearly exhortations of goodwill and brotherly love for all men, will help members of the local organization to forget their differences and give their enthusiastic support to the next president.

# No, Alabama: There's No Santa

Santa Claus didn't visit Monroeville, Ala., this year, and the small fry of all races are the innocent victims of it all.

Santa usually parades the streets during this season, but decided to bypass the town this year because of threats made by the Ku Klux Klan — not against Santa himself but against a Negro band from Union High School which has regularly been a member of Kris Kringle's entourage.

Thus, for the first time in 10 years, there was no Santa. The Klan threatened "violence" if the Union High Schoolers participated in the parade sponsored jointly by Kiwanis and Civitan clubs. During the past eight years, the band had participated with no racial disturbance.

According to A. D. Blass Jr., chairman of the committee sponsoring the parade, "I told my six-year-old daughter that Santa couldn't come... because (he) never enters a town where there is hate. She was sad that she wouldn't see the floats and get to talk to Santa on the square, but I think she understood."


Rehashing the KKK's threats, Blass said the committee was told "there will be trouble" if the Union band participated but that the committee ignored the threats. The Klan then went to Robert McMillan, principal of Union, who telephoned the committee that he could not permit the band to enter the parade for fear of what might be done to Negroes or the school.

Who are the real sufferers in this tragic game of color? The kiddies, of course. They look upon Santa's coming as their own holiday and not that of adults twisted and embittered by false senses of values and hues.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

### God Is Our Help

EVOLUTIONAL THOUGHT: Joshua 1:4-9. BACKGROUND SCRIPTURE: Acts 12. LESSON PRINT: Acts 12:12. MEMORY VERSE: I Peter 5:7. We are closing the door on 1959; time will lock it.

But before we do, we have some wealth and worthies that must be carried into 1960. Let's take stock of at least three lessons of the last quarter by looking at the early church from three angles.

GREAT LEADERS OF THE EARLY CHURCH (Luke 1:1; Acts 1:1-3, 2:14-38, 12:1-12 and Chapters 7 and 9). Someone has said this is the history book of the New Testament. So when we think of God the Holy Spirit, we'd like to think of Acts as His story — His story as wrought in the lives of the people of His time.

Look at them in line for a while. Six of them — Luke, Peter, Stephen, Phillip, Barnabas and Saul — seem to top the list.

I almost left Luke out. I often wonder why he wrote the book of Acts. However, when I read the book, I learn why. The unique way by which his philosophy of Jesus was taken up and built into the working pattern of the early church tells me why. So I start this list of great personalities with Luke.

Also, one could not read these first 12 chapters without watching Peter grow from a dwarf to a giant. Don't forget the denial of the courtyard and his weeping dust that night.

But watch his grow not merely inch by inch but foot by foot. He is Christ's brave man now. Listen to that first Pentecostal sermon. Listen to his defense before the Sanhedrin. And watch him push open the door to the gentiles.

When he was with our Lord on His mission, he saw miracles. But now he is the miracle. He has traveled from Simon the runaway to Peter the pioneer missionary, from Simon the sandman to Peter the rock.

Nor can Stephen the deacon be left out. He took a task the great shunned. The apostles refused to serve the tables that Stephen served. He made that shunned task glorious, even unto death.

He witnessed to Christ when none of the apostles were around. And he witnessed to the death, with hatred toward none.

Are you a faithful layman or maybe a deacon? What kind of witness are you giving? And we must not forget Saul and his noble encounter with Christ on the Damascus road. And, finally, Barnabas comes in as son of encouragement.

We could never have known Saul and Mark if Barnabas had not found and encouraged them. Whom have you helped to be a better Christian this year?

GREAT ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE EARLY CHURCH (Acts 1:9-14, 2:1-13 and 39-47, 4:32-37, Chapters 10 and 11; I Corinthians 12:12-31) The initial achievement for the early church was, of course, the Resurrection. Then came the Ascension.

Then the 10 Days' Tarry. What a combination of faith, patience and expectancy throbbed in them during those 10 days! It's a great thing for a church to learn to wait on the Lord.

Probably no other prayer would have been more fitting than this one: Teach us to wait. Teach us to

wait, for they that wait on the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount on wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.

How greatly is this godly patience needed today.

Then Pentecost was a very noteworthy achievement. The great achievement of the Old Testament was God for us. The great achievement of the gospels was Emanuel — God with us. The great achievement of Acts was God in us, making us like unto His Holy Son.

Another great achievement was the birth of a fellowship, the church. We often deal with the church as an organization. At Pentecost, it appears as an organism, getting its life from within.

Unless this inner, brooding life is there within a church it is no more than a club. But with this inner life, it is the very Body of Christ.

Another great achievement was that of sharing — "No man counted that which he possessed his own, and they that believed were of one soul and held all things common."

This voluntary surrender of ownership is quite socialist, it seems, but it was completely voluntary and uncoerced. No one made them do it; only love for God and observation of need could make them share thus.

Here is our Christless world, and often in the church, the year to own and master the commodities of life — comforts, pleasures, but in that early church, each was for all and all for each.

Healing of the lame man announced that healing of the body was a definite part of redemption — redemption of body, mind and soul.

We must never cover this much ground without observing the widening influence of the Christian witness — Jerusalem (home), Judea (state), Samaria (enemy states) and the uttermost parts of the earth.

Peter's housetop vision and the conversion of Cornelius and Paul were moving the gospel to you and me.

GREAT RESOURCES OF THE EARLY CHURCH (Acts 2:1-4, 4: 8-12, 31; 10:44-48) Now, what was it that turned this band of weaklings from seaside hoodlums to pulpit servants?

What made Peter the rock he was?

Let us look into this for often we as Christians are deeply discouraged and disappointed with ourselves. And deep down under we want to do better, but we just don't know how.

First, observe all through this account the word "believers." These men believed not merely something but is somebody. The Resurrection of Jesus from the grave was not merely a doctrine but a fact with them.

He was not Someone Whom they once saw at a graveside or ate with by the lake or in the Upper Room. He was a real living creature, present in their daily lives.

As they served tables from house to house, as they went to the temple and as they worked in the fields, God was real to them.

Norman Vincent Peale has written a great book on positive thinking, and how he stresses this belief business. Read his "The Power of Positive Thinking" sometime.

And then look at their insistent belief in prayer. To them,

God was as real as mother or the children. More so, because He was ever with them as they believed.

If your imagination will not stretch that far, aid it a little by making a date every morning with the Lord. Push out a chair and imagine the Master in it as you would an employer. Then talk to Him in natural terms and tone of voice.

For prayer is talking with God. Believe you have what you want, and you have it.

Inner peace is brought out in the story of Peter sleeping between two guardian angels, sleeping fearlessly though the next morning he must face death.

But he possessed such inner calm that he dropped off to sleep.

Let us close with this prayer:

O, for a faith that will not shrink  
The pressed by every foe,  
That will not tremble on the brink  
Of any earthly woe!

That will not murmur nor complain  
Beneath the chastening rod  
But, in the hour of grief or pain,  
Willelean upon its God.

A faith that shines more bright and clear  
When tempests rage without;  
That when in danger knows no fear,  
In darkness feels no doubt.

Lord, give to us such faith as this,  
And then, whatever may come,  
We'll taste, even here, the hallowed bliss  
Of an eternal home!

# The Churches Have Lost Christmas

Christmas and Santa Claus are pure words and it is very risky business to look at them critically. Nonetheless it is high time someone took the time to point out to organized American Christianity that it has lost Christmas in spite of the fact that Christmas decorations go up earlier and earlier each year and Christmas carols can be heard everywhere from the day after Thanksgiving until New Year's Day.

Mrs. Walter Ferguson, syndicated columnist, a while back in speaking of Santa Claus said, "He has become our super salesman. The Baby Jesus inspires love which makes us want to give, but Old Santa remains the figure who coaxes us into the store."

And what has become increasingly important about Christmas is that we make it to the stores. The fanciful decorations that intrigue us are not wrought out of Christian piety nor are the carols which are piped over the P. A. system evidence of owners' joy over the message of the Carpenters' Son.

The decorations are art for art's sake or at least not for the sake of the Christian religion and the carols have been transformed into seasonal popular songs.

The churches may protest and

say they have fairly well attended services on Christmas Day, but they are not naive enough not to know that the average person preparing for Christmas devotes his energies to buying, cleaning, decorating and mailing dozens of inane canned Christmas messages on printed cards to relatives, friends and slight acquaintances rather than in joyful anticipation of the program to be put on by his church.

And we have been judged by the appearance of things. Just the other day the UPI news service carried an article on the observance of Christmas in Japan, a country less than one percent Christian. Christmas has become one of the most popular holidays in Japan, among people whose religion is Taoism or Shintoism.

There is no conflict with these religions for as Christmas is celebrated there is no religious significance attached to it.

Christmas cards, Christmas gifts, Santa Claus and merry-making — these are the ingredients of the Japanese Christmas and they were borrowed from us.

The Japanese experience is not the only case in which foreigners have aped us in the celebration of the Christmas holidays. Our South-eastern neighbor, Mexico, until a few years ago knew nothing of Christmas trees, Christmas cards and the insane exchange of gifts. The gifts went to small children and then only on Jan. 6. But the states of Mexico near the American border have, each year, taken on more

and more of American customs and now the end of the more colorful and significant Mexican celebration is in sight.

But the Japanese experience has taught us something which we had tried and succeeded at without knowing it — it is quite possible to celebrate Christmas with no reverence to the Christ Child except in the message on the cards and the words of the carols which are beamed at us from everywhere. The stores have a vested interest in Christmas even if they feel that they have none in Jesus.

FOR SEVERAL YEARS this column has been calling attention to the fact that the celebration of Christmas was effectively pagan. It was the vain hope of this writer that the churches would in a concerted effort reverse this trend, but now he sees the error of his ways. The church is neither ready, willing nor anxious to buck the commercial interests of our time. And while they put on feeble "Put Christ Back into Christmas" campaigns they really do not expect them to work.

Even if the churches wanted to abolish the celebration of Christmas the stores would not permit them to. The stores will gladly give them the Babe in exchange for Old Santa. The churches are very reluctant to admit it, but they have lost Christmas.

Nevertheless the "Voice From the Gallery" wishes each of you the sanest and soberest of Christmases and a most productive New Year.

# Weak Pronouncement Of Dangerous Situation

When it was noised abroad that there was to be held in Washington a seminar on inflation by the higher-ups, this writer was highly pleased and not a little hopeful. But he was thoroughly distressed when the August assemblage came up with practically nothing.

President Eisenhower made bad matters worse by his meager statement in which he throws the whole matter into the laps of the public, where it had its genesis in the first place.

When he urged people to send letters and telegrams to Congress and congressmen, as a means of meeting the dangerous challenge of inflation, he virtually admitted defeat in the fight against inflation. It amounted to a sorry presidential pronouncement on a tremendously important problem.

As a teacher of economics for 30 years, this writer is all too familiar with the sufferings and privations and wagers that go along with inflation. When inflation has done its deadly work, we shall be ripe for communism or any other "ism."

WHEN, THEREFORE, the President would fall back upon the un-studied opinion on inflation, such as the people would have to offer in what would amount to a "Gallop poll," we are face to face with a dangerous reality. It amounts to a political move where great states-

ship is desperately needed.

One reason we have a Congress of senators and representatives is that the people cannot determine serious matters of state themselves, and so they delegate certain powers to Congress. Now, President Eisenhower is advising that we carry back to the people grave issues, which they have acknowledged that they cannot master.

We are inclined to zealously guard what we call the people's freedom and that is as it should be; but it is just as well that we bear in mind that our freedom is a hollow mockery if inflation continues to do its deadly work.

With the value of the dollar going down, down, we are threatened with an international situation that will be giving communism just the opening it is looking for. What we need in this country are more controls on our economic order.

OF COURSE, there are those who call this socialism and dictatorship, but if a degree of control is necessary to stem the tide of inflation, that would be preferable to inflation. When it comes down to the matter of survival, it is not what people want to do, or would like to do; it is a matter of what they "must" do to be saved.

The notions of freedom which existed in the horse-and-buggy era may have to be revised in this jet propulsion age, and it is a folly of the most dangerous sort to ignore this stubborn fact.

Our laws of liberty must be re-vised, if we are to compete with Russia while the communists. It is possible for a free nation to compete with a dictatorship on anything like equal terms, unless some of the freedoms are relin-

quished in the interest of national survival.

Freedom for the labor movement means freedom to exploit capital; and freedom for capital means freedom to exploit labor. The great steel strike illustrates our point, when the nation itself must step in with a measure of control to save a grievous situation. We may as well face it now, as too late, that unless there is a greater measure of controls by congress over the means and methods of production and distribution, our so-called democracy is doomed; and this doom is sealed by the controlled economy of the Russians.

They have outstripped us in the missile race. They have outstripped us in the space race. They have outstripped us in the cold war — all because they have controls, while we pride ourselves on being free!

THIS WRITER'S observations verify the conclusion that there is an optimum of controls. The Russians have too much and we have too little. Our national controls must be revised until we arrive at the optimum, and Russia's must decrease until it arrives at the optimum. Then, and not until then, will there be peaceful co-existence.

But if we attempt to carry through our notion of freedom as existed in the horse-and-buggy days, we are already lost. Personally I would rather see some of our freedom taken away under some form of modified democracy, than to have it all swept away by communism.






