

Evian Meet Seen As Successful By Jewish Delegates

EVIAN-LES-BAINS, France—Complete solution of the Austro-German refugee problem within five or six years was envisioned after the 32-power conference convened by the United States concluded a ten-day session. This hope was considered justified by the departing delegates and experts.

Chairman Myron C. Taylor's conduct of the conference, converting it to success in the face of many obstacles, gave proof of American efficiency even in the most delicate diplomatic situation. Everyone here is confident that the work of the American director of the permanent committee will be characterized by the same efficiency.

Before leaving Evian for Paris, Mr. Taylor, declaring "We mean business," mapped for this correspondent the tentative course to be taken by the man who directs the permanent bureau.

The director's first task after completion of the scheduled August 3 London meeting, he said, would be to proceed to Germany to open negotiations covering not only the question of property but the securing of normal treatment for Jews while they are still in the Reich. Following this, Mr. Taylor declared, the director will turn his energies toward the possibilities for immigration and colonization in certain colonial territories as well as overseas lands.

All observers, including the representatives of Jewish organizations consider the outcome of the conference as most satisfactory and are especially laudatory in their comments on America's taking the initiative.

Dwelling on Palestine for the first time since the conference opened on July 6, Lord Winterton said that some quarters believed the Jewish problem might be solved if only Palestine were wider open to Jewish immigration. Palestine is a small country, he said, and the British Government must consider the mandate as well as the local situation.


No Mass Settlement.

LONDON—The Nairobi Government has under consideration the question of permitting establishment of Jewish settlements in Kenya colony, Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald advised the House of Commons. "There can be no question of mass settlement of Jews in Kenya nor of disturbing land allotted for native occupation," he added, however, in reply to a query put by Laborite Arthur Creech Jones. "What is being examined," MacDonald continued, "is the possibility of the settlement of a number of Jewish families of individual holdings in small groups elsewhere. I am not in a position yet to make a more particular statement."

PLANE RAINS AMERICANISM LEAFLETS ON U. S. NAZI CAMP

25,000 Dumped At Yaphank, L. I. By Anti-Nazis

NEW YORK—A pursuit plane roared out over Long Island Sunday, spun down toward the thousands of American Nazis on the grounds of the German-American Settlement League camps at Yaphank and let go with a barrage of red, white and blue leaflets, asking the Hitlerites to follow purely American principles.

Sponsored by the Anti-Nazi League, the flight was the first move taken in North America to re-dedicate followers of the German Volksbund to the pledges they made when they became citizens of the United States.

Twenty-five thousand leaflets were dumped. The raid had been planned for several weeks. Officials of the League contacted officials of Nassau County, L. I., to ascertain that they were not violating local ordinances. Copies of the leaflets were kept under lock and key in the League's office until a few hours before the flight was to take the air, then were rushed to Floyd Bennett field by motor and loaded directly into the plane.

"China gave us the idea three months ago when they answered Japanese bombardments by dropping leaflets on the Japanese mainland," officials of the League said.

Reprisal By Jews Are Condemned In London

LONDON—Reprisals by Palestine Jews against Arab terrorism were strongly condemned by Col. Josiah Wedgwood, foremost non-Jewish Zionist and Laborite M. P. "All that the Jews have undergone in the last five years," he said in a statement, "explains the temporary insanity which makes man run amok. There would, under similar circumstances, be Englishmen who would go the same way, but nothing can justify a sane man murdering innocent Arabs by reprisals for the murder of innocent Jews."

Tom Williams, Laborite M. P., told the Anglo-Palestine Club that he had conclusive proof that Arabs are being taken to Germany and educated in Nazi propagandist methods. He charged the Italians with doing the same, offering the Arabs free education and expecting them to continue their propaganda in Palestine.

Arthur Hays Sulzberger In Stand On Jewish Questions

OMAHA, Neb.—A staunch adherent of the "American of Jewish Faith" school of thought, Arthur Hays Sulzberger, publisher of the "New York Times," last week stated that should a Jewish State be established in Palestine, it would raise the question of "whether or not I should continue to be a Jew," according to a story published in the Jewish Press, here.

When asked how western Jewry appears to a New Yorker, he replied that he came west to get the sentiments of western Americans and is sure those sentiments are the same for Jew and non-Jew alike.

If he is agitated on the Jewish question, it is as an American and humanitarian rather than a Jew, the Jewish Press said. "I do not subscribe to the theory that all Jews are brothers," the guiding spirit of the world's foremost daily said unequivocally. "When I was in the army during the war, a German Jew supposedly made as

good a target for me as any other alien soldier."

His particular interest in the present Jewish situation is the result of an ability to comprehend by reason of similar circumstances. "Should Adolph Hitler tomorrow start a campaign against red-haired people, a red-haired protective association would be organized here because by reason of their red-hair those persons would be in a better position to realize the injustice of such a campaign.

Long the target of New York's militantly articulate elements, Mr. Sulzberger has opposed any campaign on the part of American Jews to meddle in the internal affairs of countries as Poland and Germany. He further explained that he believed Mussolini was in his rights when he stated that Italian Jews could not be Zionists as long as Zionism was part of British Imperial policy and as long as that policy conflicted with Italian aims and interests.

Germans Here Dislike Nazis, Seger Declares

NEW YORK—Gerhart H. Seger, former member of the German Reichstag, has estimated that 90 per cent of all German-Americans resent Nazi interference in their affairs and will appreciate American support in resisting it. "These German-Americans," said Mr. Seger, editor of the Neue Volkszeitung, "are silent and cautious now because they are afraid of what may happen to them here and to their relatives and friends in Germany if they frankly express disapproval of Hitler and his ways."

Since 1935, 69 new Jewish welfare funds have been organized in communities in the United States and Canada, it is disclosed in the "1938 Directory of Jewish Federations, Welfare Funds and Community Councils," just published by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

Five Rabbis In Reno, But Not For Regular Reasons

CINCINNATI, O.—Reno, Nev. is host to five young men this week. But the five young men are not there for the usual reason. They are all unmarried and are in Reno as emissaries of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations on the "Jewish Religious Caravan of 1938."

With their car and trailer parked in the Nevada town they are prepared to address the local Jewish community of some two hundred persons, help the local religious school authorities with their curriculum and plans for the Fall, and preach in the name of good will at local churches.

The five trailerites were greeted in Reno by Mrs. M. A. Berman. They arrived Thursday and will remain through the Sabbath. The five are: Paul Gorin of Chicago,

Joseph Narot of Cleveland, Milton Rosenbaum of New York, Melvin Sands of Detroit and Sylvan Schwartzman of Baltimore.

Exile Professor Leaves Turkey For U.S.

ISTANBUL—Dr. Hans Reichenbach, German Jewish professor at Istanbul University, received a hearty farewell from students and instructors of all Turkish Universities as he left for the United States to take a life-long professorship in the Michigan University Department of Philosophy.

After holding the chair of philosophy here for three years, he declined the Turkish Government's offer to continue in the position for another three years.

Mexico Invites Exiled Scholars

MEXICO CITY—Denying that his government is anti-Semitic, President Lazaro Cardenas has announced he is inviting technicians, scholars and scientists from Germany, Austria and Spain, the first 21 of whom are already on their way. The statement was made in an interview in Palpa, Veracruz.

"Mexico needs technicians, not only in the oil industry, but in all our industry and culture," he said. "We want them so much that we are now taking measures to open our immigration doors wide to them. We are inviting technicians, scholars, and scientists from Germany, Austria and Spain. We are going to make it easy for them to enter the country for permanent residence, and also, because our laws require citizenship for most such positions, we are going to grant it quickly. We want them to stay with us and help us build. The first group of scholars, twenty-one of them, is already on the way. We will bring in more as fast as we or they can afford it. We are quite sure that all Mexico will appreciate their value and will make them welcome."

PRAYERS HELD IN BRITISH EMPIRE FOR JEWS

Eddie Cantor And Rabbi Rauch At Special Services

LONDON—Prayers of intercession for the persecuted Jews of Austria and Germany were held Sunday throughout the British Empire and in other countries at the call of Dr. Joseph H. Hertz, Chief Rabbi of Great Britain. Many Christian groups joined in the prayers. Synagogues throughout Britain were crowded during the special services.

An Intercession Day resolution expressing "deep indignation about the persecution and defamation to which our defenseless co-religionists in Germany have been subjected, and which has been extended with increased inhumanity to Austria" was adopted by unanimous silent standing vote at a meeting of the Board of Deputies of British Jews.

Two Americans were on the platform as the resolution was adopted—Eddie Cantor, the radio and screen star, and Rabbi Rauch of Louisville, Ky. Mr. Cantor, who is visiting England to raise \$100,000 for settlement of European Jewish children in Palestine, has already obtained 17,000 pounds (\$85,000) in less than a week that he has been here, it was announced by Neville Laski, president of the Board of Deputies.

The resolution, which was introduced by Mr. Laski and seconded by Sir Robert Waley Cohen, declared that the German policy "of deliberate cruelty puts everlasting shame on a nation which instigates it." The resolution appealed to all those striving for peace to declare their reprobation of persecution and not to rest until complete equality was restored for "our brethren and their fellow sufferers in lands of persecution."

The deputies and a crowded gallery heard Mr. Laski, in a three-quarter-hour speech, review German oppression. He said: "It makes one shudder to realize that a great power can deliberately adopt a policy placing outside the pale of humanity and law the members of the creed which gave to the world the first doctrines of morality." He concluded that they would not despair, hoping for deliverance with the aid of God.

Italy Announces Ten-Point Aryan Program

Jews Target Of New Theory

ROME—A ten-point program declaring that "Jews do not belong to the Aryan race" and that most Italians are "Aryans" was issued under the sponsorship of the Ministry of Popular Culture. The racial program, which was drawn up by a group of Fascist university professors, proclaimed the impossibility of Jewish assimilation with native stock, and provoked fears of a pending Government anti-Semitic campaign.

The program asserts the pure "Aryanism" of the great majority of Italians and the "Aryan" basis of Italian civilization. It declares that Jews "are composed of non-European elements thoroughly different from the elements which gave the Italians their origins." The dictum was laid down that since the "Aryan" characteristics of the Italian people must not be altered in any way, "union is permissible solely within European racial circles." This was interpreted in some quarters as a possible harbinger of a campaign against inter-marriage with "non-European races."

Sounding an ominous note, the authoritative Fascist newspaper *Giornala D'Italia* declared this program was destined to have a profound effect on Italian customs and "create a new racial mentality in the people."

The professors, however, disclaimed any desire to prove that one race is superior to another—in this respect differing markedly from the Nazi creed of racial supremacy. "Aryanism," according to the new Italian doctrine, is a purely biological concept, having nothing to do with religious or philosophical principles.

Italians, it maintained, should be proud of their European origins, which go back thousands of years into history and set them apart

Isaac Goldberg Taken By Death

BROOKLINE, Mass.—Dr. Isaac Goldberg, writer, scholar and critic, died last week at his home at the age of 50. He had been ill for a month, and just before his death had been planning to go to Maine to recuperate.

Dr. Goldberg distinguished himself in several fields of learning and letters. He was an authority on music, the history of modern literature of Spanish and Portuguese American, wrote several widely-acclaimed biographies of modern figures, was the author of books on literature and the drama, and, withal, found time to concern himself with current Jewish problems.

Since last December Dr. Goldberg had written a weekly column for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and associated publications throughout the country. In his column, which was entitled "Panorama: A Weekly Survey of People and Ideas," Dr. Goldberg dealt with a wide variety of subjects, in-



N.Z.O. Campaigns Against "Havlagah"

WARSAW—A nation-wide campaign against "havlagah"—the non-retaliation policy pursued by the Palestine Jews for the past two years—was launched today by the New Zionist Organization. The organization proclaimed July 31 as "Ben Josef Day" marking the end of the 30 days' mourning period for the Jewish youth executed in Palestine during which meetings will be held in 30 towns.

At the same time leaflets are being widely circulated reproducing a purported letter sent two months ago by Col. Josiah Wedgwood, pro-Zionist member of the British Parliament, to the Jewish Union of Army Officers in Tel Aviv denouncing the self-restraint policy and urging non-cooperation with the Government, non-payment of taxes and delivrance of Jewish prisoners by force.

A meeting of the Bund, Jewish Socialist party, devoted to the Palestine events stressed that the up-building of Palestine did not afford a solution of the Jewish problem.

December Zionist Meet To Weigh Partition

LONDON—The convening of the twenty-first Zionist Congress in December is regarded in Zionist circles here as very probable, the J. T. A. learns from reliable sources.

It is expected that the Palestine Partition Commission will complete its work in Palestine by the end of July and will return to London at the beginning of August. Supplementary evidence will be heard by the commission in London during the beginning of August, and it is expected that the report of the Commission will be in the hands of the Government not later than September.

It is pointed out in this connection that the opinion often expressed in the British press, that the adoption by the British government of a definite and unambiguous solution of the Palestine problem is essential for the restoration of order in the country, has also gained ground among the members of the Cabinet, and that consequently the Government will urge the Palestine Partition Commission to submit its report with the least possible delay.

The British Government, the J. T. A. understands, is eager that the Palestine proposals should be discussed by the League of Nations at its session in January, 1938. It will probably submit its final proposals for the approval of Parliament in October or November so as to be able to come to Geneva with a plan to which Parliament has given its consent.

Under such circumstances the Zionist Congress will have to be convened in December in order to formulate the Jewish attitude to the plan before the session of the League of Nations.

Fortune Cites Irna Phillips As Air's No. 1 Author

Special
NEW YORK—Irna Phillips, author of three NBC daily serials, is cited as "Radio's No. 1 author" by Fortune Magazine in a story devoted to her in the June, 1938 issue.

"Radio's No. 1 author by volume of writing is Irna Phillips," the article says, "for at the moment she has three serial programs running, which add up to about 2,000,000 words a year, is planning a fourth. Her first network serial was Today's Children, which ran twice daily for over five years; and though one radio poll credited it with the largest audience of any quarter-hour daytime show, Miss Phillips persuaded the sponsor (Pillsbury Flour) to abandon it last January in favor of a new one called Woman in White, which is about nurses. That was taking a chance, but at the end of the new show's third month it also ranked first. Her other shows are Road of Life, about doctors, and The Guiding Light, about ministers."

Miss Phillips, the youngest of ten children, didn't start out to be a radio-script writer. What she did start out to be isn't quite clear, but she went through the University of Illinois, took her master's degree in dramatics at Wisconsin, and a post-graduate course in journalism at Northwestern, ended up as a teacher of English, public speaking, and dramatics at a Dayton, Ohio, normal school. One Summer vacation she played some bit parts on a radio program in Chicago. The director asked her if she'd try writing a script and she said all right. That was about five years ago, and to date her output has been 8,000,000 words for radio.

Miss Phillips still lives and works in Chicago. She dictates her first drafts to a stenographer, acting out all the parts the while. When a milkman is to appear in an episode, she invites one into her office, and her stenographer takes down the random conversation for future reference.

The Editor's Chair:

The editorial writer of The Jewish Ledger publications said last week anent the Hague incident: "Emil Lengyel tells of an incident in the war in his book 'Cattle Car Express'. Some soldiers were in a dugout when a shell dropped on the floor of their shelter. They sat there holding their breath, hoping that maybe if they kept very quiet the shell wouldn't notice them and perhaps then it wouldn't explode. This is about how the Hague incident has been handled by the Anglo-Jewish press.

I beg to take exception to this all-inclusive statement. This paper dug right into the Hague-Rabbi Plotkin imbroglio, comparing the rabbi's proposed ouster to that infamous dismissal, when Rabbi Benjamin B. Goldberg was forced to leave his Montgomery, Ala., pulpit because his congregation quaked in their cowardly boots when their spiritual leader espoused the cause of the since-vindicated Negroes. And that was long before the incident had grown to its present odorous dimensions.

The first thing this paper intends doing this fall to vindicate itself for using the title, newspaper, is to make a survey of married couples of the five-year or less vintage to determine how many keep "kosher" homes, how many attend synagogue, and so forth. As far as I know there are no reliable statistics on the young married set. I know the Jewish butchers would be interested, but for various other reasons, the survey should be interesting and valuable. Just for the record I'll guess that maybe twenty-five percent keep kosher homes, but that about sixty percent are members of a congregation.

To Be Or Not To Be, Mr. Sulzberger

"HE further explained that he believed Mussolini was in his rights when he stated that Italian Jews could not be Zionists as long as Zionism was part of British imperial policy and as long as that policy conflicted with Italian aims and interests".

The above is from a story in the Jewish Press, of Omaha, Neb., and allegedly presents the views of Arthur Hays Sulzberger, son-in-law of the late Adolph Ochs, and present owner of the New York Times.

By upbringing and background Jews are naturally pacifistically inclined. But not so Mussolini. To be a pacifist in Italy goes directly counter to all that Fascism and its rehabilitation of Roman might stands for. Oh, Oh. Then according to Mr. Sulzberger any person of the Jewish faith has no right to advocate peace, but must abjure the cardinal precept of Judaism lest he believe in something which might be found objectionable by the great conqueror of Ethiopia.

Was it not that straightest thinker of the present day, Justice Louis D. Brandies, who said to be a Zionist was to be a better American. To be a Zionist means to advocate Palestine as a homeland for Jews. For an Italian Jew to do all in his power to aid the development of Palestine as a homeland for Jews means that he is

running counter to Mussolini's intention of arousing the Arabs in the Eastern Mediterranean against British rule.

Mussolini does not object to Jews finding a haven in Palestine. But to foster his political ambitions, he must have the Arabs kill the Jews so England will have to make a concession to Italy to gain surcease from this type of dastardly propaganda. To object to the Ethiopian conquest, to object to Il Duce's formenting of strife in Palestine, or in any other land, is verboten to Italian Jews, according to Mr. Sulzberger's definition of the position of the Jew.

Then why be a Jew. Why go to the trouble to read the passage in the Prophets about turning swords into plowshares. Let all Jewry disappear.

Whatever specious reasoning Mr. Sulzberger is trying to compound to rationalize his present stand on the world Jewish question, he is certainly straying far from the straight and narrow path of clear reasoning. His words are reminiscent of the stand of that emaciated type of Reform Judaism under which our fathers were brought up, and which the past few years has relegated to that limbo of experiments, kindly in intention, but impractical and fallacious in execution.

The Anti-Nazi League Takes To The Air

THE new air "attack" on the Nazis by the Anti-Nazi League should be a great deal more successful than many of its heretofore abortive attempts, if for no other reason than its spectacular aspect.

As the first attack in their new campaign, the League, over the Fourth of July week-end, sent up a plane bearing a long trailing sign with the message, "You Pay For Nazi Spies If You Buy Nazi Goods". Then last Sunday, the League carried the war into the enemy's own territory when they dropped 25,000 Americanism leaflets on the Nazi camp at Yaphank, L. I.

Admitting they borrowed the idea from the

Chinese "pamphlet raid" on Japan when Chinese ships flew to Japan and dropped propaganda bulletins over Japan's cities, the League announced the successful raid and gave promise of newer and more surprising tactics. For years now the League has been tolerated by newspapermen who were plagued with a multitude of releases based less on accomplishment than on actual results. But now the League is giving the newspapers real stories. Whoever is responsible deserves much credit, and if the activities of the past few weeks continue, newspapers will soon be sending reporters to the League's office to "cover" that valuable news source.

Comments On Current Topics

The Every Friday of Cincinnati, Points Out "Bad Press" Palestine Receiving.—We have purloined the headline of this editorial from the Cincinnati Enquirer's editorial page, so as to emphasize the double-barreled barrage to which Palestine is being subjected these days. Not enough that news reports in the press and on the radio are crammed full with accounts of slayings and bombings and acts of terror, but radio-commentators and news mis-interpreters add their share to the general confusion.

The Jewish role in the travail of Palestine is receiving definitely "a bad press," due either to prejudice or lack of understanding. Two samples may suffice.

Last Sunday on Columbia's "Headlines and Bylines" program, H. V. Kaltenborn, known to be anti-Zionistic, attempted to trace the present unrest in Eretz Yisroel to "the discrepancy in British promises made to the Arabs in 1915 and to the Jews in 1917." Mr. Kaltenborn, unable to understand how the attempt to establish in Palestine a national home for Jews should not interfere with the Arab right to religious freedom, quoted as authority on the possibilities and potentialities of Zionism none other than—you guessed it: Henry Morgenthau, Sr.

Now Mr. Morgenthau has about the same standing as an authority on Jewish affairs as Bill Lemcke or Dr. Townsend have on matters American. But Mr. Kaltenborn did not mention that over the Columbia network. Nor will his millions of non-Jewish listeners bother to find out whether the Arab right to religious freedom has ever been tampered with—as indeed it has not. But the broadcast remains..... propaganda and not information.

The other sample of "bd press" is culled from the Enquirer, usually excellently well informed

in matters of international politics. Says the editorial: "The present disorders..... are traceable to the British attempt to convert an Arab State into a homeland for Jews."

It is, of course, always hard to over-simplify such complicated reactions, as have led to the present state of affairs in Palestine. But if the Enquirer intended to "explain" the travail of Palestine, it would have been much more accurate to say: "the present disorders... are traceable to the lack of efforts, in spite of promises, on the part of Great Britain to assist the Jews in the conversion of desert and swamps into a homeland for Jews and native Arabs."

For in the year of the Balfour Declaration there existed no Arab State and, since given the mandate, Britain has not attempted to convert it into anything except a battlefield.

The Philadelphia Exponent Says Change From New York Leadership May Be General Trend.

Incidentally this is the first time in years, that is, since the retirement of Dr. Herbert Friedenwald of Baltimore, that the office of president of the Zionist Organization of America has been filled by one who is not a resident of New York City. Zionists outside the metropolis will welcome this change. Many of the latter are of the opinion that the concentration of Jewish leadership and of Jewish national movements in New York City has not been advantageous to the American Jewish community. Nor has it proved especially beneficial to the Jews of New York City. The national capital is viewed as a much more logical center. B'nai B'rith set an example several months ago when it removed its national headquarters from Cincinnati to Washington. Whether the Zionist movement will follow suit remains to be seen.

69 New Jewish Welfare Funds Since 1935

NEW YORK—Since 1935, 69 new Jewish welfare funds have been organized in communities in the United States and Canada, according to the "1938 Directory of Jewish Federations, Welfare Funds and Community Councils," just published by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

The directory lists 215 community agencies in 173 cities in 37 states, the District of Columbia and five Canadian provinces. Of these organizations, 107 are welfare funds, 40 are federations which coordinate the social welfare work of the community and 24 are federations which also perform welfare fund functions.
