NOTES AND OBSERVATIONS ON MATTERS AROUND TOWN.

The benefit to the Charity society will be given at the opera house on Tuesday evening, November 10th, and will be in the shape of a concert. Tickets are now being sold, and there ought to be a great demand for them.

There has never been a fight for a city contract as determined or as bitter as that in progress between the gas and electric light companies for the lighting of the streets for a term of years beginning February 1st.
