operated an organ. But this was opportunity and he accepted his father's invitation without hesitation.

That his first effort was acceptable may be seen from the fact that he was employed to play regularly for the Sunday school thereafter. Soon he was also appointed organist for the church services, the regular musician in charge of the organ music having expressed a desire to limit her activities to vocal soloist.

Following his first appearance, the future Pomona College organist began to take lessons on the instrument and carried on as church organist for seven years until he graduated from DePauw.

The pipes stored in Greencastle for the past 10 years were trucked several months ago by the M. P. Moller company to its plant in Hagerstown, Md., where they were revoiced and regulated for the Blanchard home.

For all practical purposes, the organ is a new piece of musical equipment. The revoiced old pipes and a few additional ones, the three-manual console of solid black walnut and the mechanical equipment to operate the organ, all represent a brand new installation. The organ is the 8,798th reconstructed by the Moller company, which also manufactured the new organ in Bridges hall last year.

In addition to his many other accomplishments, Mr. Blanchard placed all of the preliminary electrical wiring necessary for operation of the 1-2 horse power motor and the 10-volt generator which manufactures the organ current supply.

The addition housing the pipes is 10x15 with 14-foot ceiling. The tone opening through which the organ speaks is 13 feet long by 8 feet high and will be concealed by grillwork. Because the factory has voiced the organ for use in the living room, which is 18x34 with 15-foot ceiling, Mr. Blanchard feels that he will be able to make full use of the 843-pipe instrument without disturbing the neighborhood peace.

His 7-year-old son Billy is an interested spectator of the installation and like his father before him hopes that one day he will be an organist.





Excess Profits Tax Bill Ready

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The House tax subcommittee agreed last night to an excess profits levy which would impose taxes of 25 to 40 per cent on a certain proportion of industry's profits arising from the huge defense program and yield the Treasury \$300,000,000 to \$500,000,000 a year.

The measure also would permit concerns which expand their plants for the purpose of handling government arms contracts to charge off the cost of their expansion against their earnings within five years at the rate of 20 per cent a year, or sooner if the emergency should end.

This was a point on which many industrialists sought reassurance before accepting government contracts. The plan provides two alternatives by which companies may compute the "excess profits" which would be subject to tax. Setting 1936-39 as a "base period," one plan is based on current earnings as compared with the average earnings over the base period; the other takes account of earnings and invested capital.

Under either alternative the first \$5,000 of a concern's "excess profit" would be exempt from any tax. Chairman Cooper, Democrat, Tennessee, of the subcommittee said that this was "designed to take care of the small companies" and estimated that it would exempt all but 70,000 of the 475,000 corporations in the country from paying the tax.

For "excess profits" beyond \$5,000 the tax rates would be 25, 30 and 40 per cent. The 25 per cent tax would apply to so much of a firm's excess profits as equaled 10 per cent of its "tax credit." The 30 per cent tax would apply to the second 10 per cent and the 40 per cent tax to the remainder of the excess profits.

The "tax credits" could be figured in two ways. Under the first plan a concern simply would deduct
