

EX-PRESIDENT OF UNIVERSITY DIES IN WEST

DR. GEORGE R. GROSE, 82, HEADED DEPAUW FOR ELEVEN YEARS

Dr. George Richmond Grose, 82 years, a former president of DePauw University and a retired Methodist bishop, died Wednesday in Altadena, California, where he had made his home since his retirement as Methodist church representative in China.

Dr. Grose was ordained a Methodist minister in 1896 and served as president of DePauw from 1913 to 1924. In 1924 he was elected a bishop of the Methodist church and was assigned to direct its missions in China. In 1930, he moved to Altadena and retired as a bishop two years later.

He was the author of many religious books. For more than 20 years he was religious editor of the Pasadena (Calif.) Star-News.

Dr. Grose, fifth president of the university, was a native of West Virginia. He was a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan in 1894 and Boston University School of Theology in 1896. Prior to coming to DePauw, he was pastor of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church in Baltimore. Other pastorate held by Dr. Grose before going to Baltimore were Cherry Valley, Jamaica Plain, Newton and Lynn, all in Massachusetts.

He succeeded Francis John McConnell as president of DePauw. He took leave in 1921 for a trip to China to gather material on the late Bishop Bashford. The late Dr. Henry Boyer Longden served as acting president of the university when Dr. Grose left until the appointment of Dr. Lemuel H. Murlin.

Dr. Grose is survived by the widow, Lucy, and five children. Funeral services will be held from the First Methodist church in Altadena on Friday. Interment will be in Forest Hill cemetery in this city.

LOCAL TROOPER IS ASSIGNED TO SEYMOUR POST

EUGENE ST. JOHN TO REPLACE DEMOTED OFFICER AFTER SHAKEUP

As result of a major shakeup in the state police post at Seymour Wednesday, Trooper Eugene St. John of Greencastle, will be transferred from the Putnamville Post to replace Sgt. Chester W. Wilson, of Columbus, who was demoted to trooper in the Seymour district. He was also promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

Four officers were involved in the shakeup of personnel at the Seymour Post. Supt. Frank A. Jessup appeared in person at the Seymour Post Wednesday to announce the changes following an investigation.

Supt. Jessup charged that each of the replaced officers had "failed to provide leadership in his district and as a result had deteriorated the morale in his area of command."

In the other three changes Lt. Harry McMillin, R. R. 2, Seymour, was reduced to detective and succeeded by Sgt. Stanley W. Guth, commander of the Evansville department post.

Sgt. Forrest A. Brewer, Franklin, was replaced by Detective Joseph D. O'Brien, Bedford, of the Jasper district, and Cpl. John N. Cury, Seymour, was succeeded by Trooper Hubert E. Roush, Indianapolis. Brewer and Cury both were demoted to trooper.

Jessup said that vacancies created in the four districts through the change in personnel would be filled at a later date.


From an investment of \$175.09 in 1932, Langdon Brothers, through the employment of ingenuity and initiative, have progressed from a huckster wagon to the present large business, which consists of a modern grocery, the buying of poultry and eggs from farmers of several surrounding counties, the dressing of poultry and the wholesale distribution of the finished product. Mr. Beck brought out in his interesting talk, that during the depression, Langdon Brothers on finding that the farmers didn't always have the money to pay for groceries started buying their poultry and eggs. This led to further expansion, which involved the selling of the baby chicks, the feed, and finally the buying of the poultry when it was ready for market. The speaker pointed out that in one month in 1932, Langdon Brothers hauled into Chicago one tenth of all the poultry supplied by Indiana.

Allies Study New Red Plan

PANMUNJOM, Korea, May 7. (UP)—The Communists dropped their demand for removal of war prisoners to a neutral country today and offered a plan to end the Korean truce deadlock that was considered so "important" it was sent to Washington for study.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il, head of the Communist truce delegation submitted an eight-point proposal at a 26-minute meeting.

Nam's proposal bowed to two major United Nations demands on disposition of 46,000 anti-Communist prisoners held by the Allies and practically accepted the old Indian plan adopted by the U. N. General Assembly in New York last Dec. 3 and then rejected by Russia and four of her satellites.

Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison, chief U. N. negotiator, called a one-day recess until 11 a. m. Saturday, 10 p. m. EDT Friday, in order to forward the proposition to Washington through Gen. Mark W. Clark, Supreme United Nations Commander in the Far East.

Harrison said Nam's proposal "merits consideration, careful thought."

Only one of Nam's points, No. 5, might erect a stumbling block.

Reds In Clergy Asserts Velde

NEW YORK, May 7. (UP)—Rep. Harold H. Velde, R-Ill., chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee, said today he is convinced "hardened and well-trained Communists" have been planted in the American clergy.

He renewed his intention of investigating Communist whether they are "in overalls or in sanctified cloth."

Velde made his remarks in a speech prepared for delivery before the American Jewish League Against Communism, Inc. The organization gave him a plaque and praised him for "undaunted patriotism in exposing the hidden enemy of our country and faith."

Claim Stassen Held Up Report

WASHINGTON, May 7. (UP)—Republican congressmen today accused Mutual Security Director Harold E. Stassen of suppressing a critical report by 55 business leaders who surveyed the U. S. foreign aid program at his request.

They charged that the report is "embarrassing" to Stassen because it recommended sharp cuts in the aid program and called for abolishing Stassen's Mutual Security Agency.

Stassen, who scheduled a closed-door meeting with the business survey team today, admitted in testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Wednesday that some members of the group had called for shifting foreign aid functions to the State Department. Both Stassen and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles oppose this idea.

GOOD EXCUSE

WHITING, Ind., May 7. (UP)—Ramon Cruz, a 23-year old soldier, was caught driving without a license by Whiting police. But they released him as soon as they heard his explanation. "I lost it 28 days ago," Cruz said. "In the mud in Korea."

Eisenhower To Deliver Speech

NEW YORK, May 7. (UP)—President Eisenhower comes here tonight for this state's biggest Republican dinner on record, at which more than 3,500 persons will pay \$100 a plate for a total of \$350,000, less expenses, to the party's campaign fund.

It will be the fifth annual fund-raising dinner of the New York State Republican Committee and the reservations were so numerous the committee took over the main ballrooms of two of the city's largest hotels, the Waldorf-Astoria and the Astor.

The President will speak at both gatherings and to a nationwide television and radio audience.

Such a setting, political circles reported, may be chosen for an open announcement or at least a guarded hint as to the honor the new administration may be planning to bestow on one of Mr. Eisenhower's earliest supporters, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, who so far has disclaimed any aspiration other than to serve out his term.

Dewey will be present, as will leaders of the organization he has built in the 11 years he has been governor.

Mr. Eisenhower indicated at Augusta, Ga., shortly after the election last November that he wanted Dewey on his "team." In a prepared statement after the

LAS VEGAS, Nev. May 7. (UP) The most elaborate atomic test ever held in the United States, originally scheduled today, was postponed for 24 hours because of unfavorable weather conditions.

Weather permitting, the blast will be held at Frenchman Flat Proving Ground, 65 miles north-east of here, between 11 and 11:30 a. m. EDT Friday morning.

SANTIAGO, Chile, May 7. (UP)—Central Chile dug out today from the rubble left by an earthquake that killed at least seven persons, injured more than 100 and inflicted heavy damage on two cities. In Concepcion alone, damage was estimated at \$1,600,000.

HARWICH, England, May 7. (UP)—The stern half of the wrecked British steamer Duke of York neared harbor here today, with three bodies believed tangled in the shambles caused by a sea collision Wednesday.

A fourth victim, Ann Amsdell of Britain died in a hospital here Wednesday night after being pulled from the wreckage.

One body had been sighted in the twisted steel where the York's bow was shorn off in a collision with the U. S. Freighter Haiti Victory, and authorities believed that there were at least two more bodies aboard.

WASHINGTON, May 7. (UP)—President Eisenhower got in 18 holes of golf at Burning Tree Club Wednesday despite showers.

VIENNA, May 7. (INS)—Reports reaching Vienna today said a U. S. plane carrying two high-ranking officers was believed to have made an emergency crash-landing in Yugoslavia near the Austrian border. There was no immediate confirmation of the reports.

WASHINGTON, May 7. (INS)—The retirement of Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg was announced today and President Eisenhower promptly named Gen. Nathan P. Twining as his successor.

NEW YORK, May 7. (INS)—Gen. James A. Van Fleet said today that "the start of an all-out effort in Korea would soon make the Reds come begging to us."

The retired UN commander declared that the present truce talks might be a mistake and decried what he called "overzealousness for peace at any price."

WASHINGTON, May 7. (INS)—Two experts on waterfront conditions told Senate investigators today what steps the government can take to end crime and corruption on the New York docks.

WASHINGTON, May 7. (INS)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley told Congress today that Russia is rapidly increasing its "atomic capability" and that "the possibility of war is still with us."

The chairman of the joint chiefs of staff made the statement in a closed session of the House Foreign Affairs Committee while testifying on the administration's 5.8 billion dollar foreign aid program.

FAVORS RATE CUT
INDIANAPOLIS, May 7.—(UP)—A city official fighting Indiana Gas and Water Co.'s bid for a gas rate boost in 59 cities and towns said today the rates should be reduced, not increased. Mayor C. Pralle Erni of New Albany, one of a dozen mayors and city attorneys joining in the utility's hearing before the state Public Service Commission, said the evidence convinced him "they should reduce rates instead of raising them." He complained the utility ignored depreciation in figuring its rate request, paid \$44,000 in excess profits taxes to the federal government last year, and padded its figures on higher costs of natural gas from pipeline suppliers. The utility wants a 10.94 per cent increase, which would cost its 87,000 customers \$995,656 a year. L. B. Schiesz, the company president, was cross-examined as the hearing resumed Wednesday after a six-week recess by Public Counselor James T. Robison and Chester Wentzell, New Albany city attorney. Wentzell said the testimony showed the company set property depreciation at \$3,600,000 since 1949. He said that amount was subtracted from operating costs but not from the fair value of property. "They're taking the depreciation for tax reduction purposes but not for rate reduction purposes," Erni said.
