## SEVEN LODGED IN LOCAL JAIL TUESDAY NIGHT

### TWO RUNAWAY YOUTHS WERE AMONG GROUP PICKED UP

Sheriff Joe Rollings reported that the Putnam county jail had seven additional "guests" Wednesday morning as a result of a series of arrests Tuesday night.

Joseph F. Veitenham, 18, of Appleton, Wisconsin, was jailed at 9 p. m. by Sheriff Rollings and Policeman Russell Coleman and charged with public intoxication.

Dennis Crossman, 23, Chokio, Minnesota, was picked up a short time later by the sheriff for public intoxication.

Charles Haymes, 58, Camden, Michigan, was arrested by city police at 9:15 p. m. for public intoxication.

All three were taken into custody on the north side of the public square. Sheriff Rollings said they are employed in telephone construction work at Cloverdale.

Robert Creekmore, 17, and Robert Frazier, 16, runaway youths from Meridian, Mississippi, were brought to the jail at 10 p. m. by state police.

The boys told the authorities they were on their way to Ohio. They are being held until their parents send transportation money for the return trip home.

Reeve Morlan was also picked up in South Greencastle Tuesday night and probably will be charged with parole violation.

State farm officials also brought Arthur Martin, 19, to the county jail pending arraignment in circuit court for escaping from the Putnamville institution.

Grossman, Veitenham and Haymes appeared before Justice of the Peace Ola T. Ellis Wednesday and all entered pleas of guilty to public intoxication. Each was fined \$1 and costs.

Gerald Lee Edwards, 18, was fined \$1 and costs for having improper mufflers on his car. He was arrested Tuesday by Sheriff Rollings.

Police Chief John Vermillion today announced the route of Vice President Richard M. Nixon's motorcade tour of downtown Greencastle on Saturday morning.

Starting from the home of Dr. Russell J. Humbert, at approximately 10:45 a. m., the motorcade will move north on Wood street to Washington, west on Washington to Indiana, north on Indiana to Franklin, west on Franklin to Jackson, east on Jackson to Washington, south on Washington to Indiana, south on Indiana to Seminary, east on Seminary to Locust and south on Locust to the DePauw Union Building.

Police request that citizens residing on the route of the motorcade to park their autos in the driveway of their homes until after Mr. Nixon and his party have passed.

## POLICE REPORT 171 VEHICLES ARE DEFECTIVE

### SAFETY CHECK HAS BEEN MADE ON TOTAL OF 1,392 VEHICLES

As of Wednesday morning, city and state police have conducted a safety check of 1,392 motor vehicles in Greencastle since April 29. Of this number, 171 vehicles were found to be defective.

The officers have been making spot checks at various times each day and at various places. For example Tuesday afternoon, they spent two hours on South Jackson street and checked 125 vehicles. Of this group, 18 were defective.

The safety check consists of examination of lights, brakes, horns and also drivers' licenses.

The 171 defective vehicles are slightly better than 12 per cent of the 1,392 checked to date which is higher than the authorities like to see. Owners of the defective vehicles were instructed to remedy their individual mechanical imperfections and this action will make their machines much more safer for all concerned.

## Teacher Wields Paddle On 15

GARY (UP)—Parents today clamored for the ouster of a sixth grade teacher here who paddled 15 of his pupils.

The teacher, Gordon D. Schipper, decided to straighten out his sixth grade class at the Edison school Friday. He used a wooden paddle on both boys and girls.

Principal Clarence E. Swingle said some of the parents told him their children were "black and blue."

"Schipper used poor judgement and went beyond any reasonable limits," said Swingle.

Schipper said he hopes the mass spanking will be a "test case" for the entire school. He said the action was due to a combination of incidents over a long period.

He said the children did not respect teachers and he could not expect teachers and he could not "stomach just so much."

Schipper continued teaching today amid the furor.

Supt. of schools Alden H. Blankenship said Schipper made a mistake, but "he is a good and conscientious teacher and I want to help him straighten this out."

The father of one of the spanked pupils came to Schipper's defense.

"Teachers should take more action to keep discipline in school and parents should back them up," he said. "If my boy gets paddled in school again, I told him he could expect another one when he gets home."

Presented annually to the senior who has contributed most to the university, the Walker Cup was one of more than 50 honors announced at this morning's Recognition Chapel.

Schrier, pre-medical honor student, campus leader, and all-conference basketball and baseball player, also received the Sigma Delta Chi scholar-athlete trophy and the Student Senate's athlete-of-the-year award.

## Committee OK's Postal Increase

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Post Office Committee yesterday approved the administration's request for a 1-cent increase for first class and air mail letters and postcards.

The increases would boost postal revenues \$365,800,000 a year.

The action, taken at a closed door meeting, was announced by Chairman Tom Murray D-Tenn. The committee today took up the administration's request to hike second class newspaper and magazine and third class advertising matter postage rates a total of \$96,200,000 in the next fiscal year.

The committee action would increase: First class letter rates from 3 to 4 cents an ounce, to bring in \$314,700,000 extra per year. Postcard rates from 2 to 3 cents, producing \$32,600,000. Drop letter rates from 2 to 3 cents, amounting to \$1,200,000. Air mail letter rates from 6 to 7 cents, producing \$17,100,000. Air mail postcards from 4 to 5 cents, producing \$200,000.

## GREENCASTLE CITIZENS FACE \$7 TAX RATE

### NEW HIGH SCHOOL TO ADD \$1.25 TO LOCAL PROPERTY TAX

Greencastle is facing a \$7 or higher tax rate. The present rate is \$5.63, and the proposed new high school building will add another \$1.25 or more to this rate, making a grand total of close to \$7.00 for property in Greencastle. If one considers the assessed valuation of property, this will mean every 15 years, one will pay the full assessed valuation on property.

A few communities around us have a \$7.00 rate now, but they are still in the minority. The school will cost about \$1,500,000. Add the rate of interest to this over the 25 or 30 years the bonds will run, and it will cost twice this sum.

One proposal today was that the buildings are used only a few hours a day and for less than nine months a year. This proposal was to hold school 12 months a year and graduate a class every eight or nine months. Universities are considering the use of their buildings more than a few hours daily, so why not the public schools. If the new plan were adopted, it could mean the use of teachers 12 months year, and it could mean the use of fewer class rooms and buildings. Many teachers work during their vacations, so why not let them teach as most people work 12 months or near it, a year.

The ever increasing high tax rate is a serious one and one that deserves to be solved before it is too late. The time to think about the \$7 to \$8 tax rate, is before it gets here.

## \$30,000 Is Sought In Damage Suits

A total of \$30,000 in damages is sought in two suits filed in the Putnam circuit court as result of a traffic accident on U. S. 231.

John W. Galloway and Mary Galloway are the plaintiffs in one suit and Theory Mugg is the defendant in both suits.

Mr. and Mrs. Galloway state that they are the parents of Barbara Galloway, 17, who on December 28, 1955, was riding as a guest in a car owned by John Galloway and driven by Joseph Galloway.

The suit sets out that they were traveling south on the 231 toward Spencer when the auto was struck from the rear by a car driven by Theory Mugg. Barbara Galloway was injured in the accident and as a result is now totally blind. Negligence and carelessness on the part of the defendant is charged and \$20,000 in damages is asked.

In a second suit, Barbara Galloway, by her next best friend, her father, John W. Galloway, asks \$10,000 for injuries which caused permanent blindness.



**Delicately Bid Slam Takes Delicate Play**

By Alfred Sheinwold

Many players would miss the slam in today's hand because there aren't enough "points" for a slam. The fact remains that there are enough tricks, and that's what counts in the end. The important bid is South's jump to three diamonds. This shows good distribution and considerable strength in South's two bid suits. With lesser strength, South could get by with a bid of only two diamonds.

North must take the bull by the horns after this fine bid. He has magnificent support for diamonds and aces in both black

suits. If North had king-queen in each black suit, he would have more points but he would not consider a slam. When it comes to bidding a slam, there's nothing like a few aces.

A spade opening would have made matters easy for South. The actual club lead gave him some trouble.

Declarer took the first trick in dummy with the ace of clubs and drew two rounds of trumps with the ace and king. Unfortunately, the queen did not fall.

South continued with three top hearts, discarding two clubs from dummy. He ruffed a heart in dummy and got his first stroke of luck when it turned out that East had to follow suit. Now declarer took the ace of spades and ruffed a spade. He could then lead his last heart and discard the last club from dummy.






