Bayh To Ask For State Port

WASHINGTON UPI — Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., said Thursday he will introduce legislation in Congress to permit federal participation in the construction of a deep-water port in Porter County, Ind.

The estimated federal share of the cost to get the project under way is \$25 million. Bayh said it "appears likely" that the Indiana Legislature, which convenes in January, will support Gov.-elect Roger Branigan's request for funds to build the Lake Michigan port.

"The basis for federal participation would be recognition of the value to the U. S. of an additional deep-water port on Lake Michigan," Bayh said.

Tourist Spending

WASHINGTON UPI — More foreign tourists visited the United States and spent more money here in 1964 than in any previous year.

The Commerce Department reported Wednesday that nearly 1 million foreign business and pleasure visitors will have traveled to the United States by the end of the year, spending \$375 million in the process.

Steckler Confers With Attorneys

INDIANAPOLIS UPI — Federal Judge William F. Steckler conferred yesterday with attorneys involved in two suits seeking more equal representation in Indiana's legislature.

Steckler said purpose of the meeting was to "ascertain what the views of the lawyers are" on the constitutionality of the 1963 Reapportionment Law, so that pleadings in the case may be updated.

The suits by State Sen.-elect Nelson G. Grills, D-Indianapolis, and the Indiana Civil Liberties Union were filed prior to the enactment of the 1963 redistricting act and actually attacked the 1921 apportionment plan.

However, the consolidated suits were kept alive after the U. S. Supreme Court handed down rulings which appeared to cast the 1963 plan in doubt.

LOS ANGELES UPI — Police are holding James Lanius Owens, 47, for the \$1,235 robbery of the Wilmington branch of the Bank of America.

DETROIT UPI — Funeral services will be held Saturday for Helen Bower, veteran movie critic who spent 47 of her 68 years with the Detroit Free Press. She died Wednesday in Henry Ford Hospital where she had been confined since Feb. 28 after being struck by a car.

CHICAGO UPI — Dr. H. Horton Sheldon, 71, chairman of the Roosevelt University physics department and a pioneer in the physical sciences, died Wednesday.

WEST BERLIN UPI — Thousands of West Berliners laden with gifts streamed through the Berlin wall yesterday to spend Christmas Eve with relatives in the Soviet sector.

About 10,000 guarded armed eastern border guards in the morning with passes good until midnight.

In the five days since the Reds opened the wall for the holidays about 187,250 West Berliners have been reunited briefly with relatives in Red Berlin.

Regular traffic across the East-West border has been halted since the wall was built three years ago.

Gas Co. Makes Revenue Report For Fiscal Year

West Berliners Visit Relatives

Operating revenues of \$29,265,000 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1964, were reported by Indiana Gas & Water Co., Inc., in its annual report. This is an increase of 3.9% over the preceding year. Operating expenses and taxes were up 1.3%.

Net income amounted to \$3,222,388 in 1964, an increase of \$269,354 over the previous year. This was equal to \$1.89 per share based on 1,704,883 shares outstanding at the year-end compared with \$1.77 per share in 1963 on 1,671,580 shares.

In the 75 communities served by Indiana Gas & Water Co., gas customers totalled 126,772. In seven of these same communities, where water is served, water customers totalled 35,490.

Revenues from the sale of approximately 40 billion cubic feet of natural gas accounted for 92% of total revenues and 8% from the sale of 3 million gallons of water. Approximately three-fourths of gas revenues were derived from residential and commercial customers.

Expenditures for new plant and equipment during 1964 amounted to \$5,069,885. Nearly 90% of this was devoted to the extension and improvement of gas facilities to provide an increasing volume of gas to the growing number of customers.

Progress during the last 15 years has been accomplished without any increase in the Company's general service rates and despite increased wage and salary costs, taxes and other operating expenses, the report states. All rate increases by pipeline suppliers have been fully absorbed by the Company during this period.

Contributing in substantial measure to the company's ability to maintain the same gas rates over the past 15 years are its underground storage fields which make it possible to meet, most economically, the heavy demand for gas during the heating season. By storing the gas in these underground reservoirs, the gas can be purchased from the pipeline suppliers at a more uniform and more economical rate. Underground fields are located in the vicinities of West Point, Unionville and Greensburg and have a combined capacity of 4.3 billion cubic feet. This is an increase of 15% over last year.

At year's end Indiana Gas & Water Co., employees totalled 723. More than half have been with the company at least 10 years and 35 for 15 years or more.

Air Force Given Christmas Gift, Big Cargo Plane

WASHINGTON UPI — The administration has announced a \$750 million Christmas present for the Air Force, but has kept its silence about decisions that will produce less joy in the services.

The single dramatic item in the new military budget, discussed by President Johnson and defense chiefs, appears to be the gigantic cargo plane which will be developed over several years at an eventual cost of \$750 million.

A portion of the airplane development money will be included in the new budget being sent to Congress next month. Called C5, the plane is intended for service in the 1970s.

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara discussed the C5 design, a product of Air Force studies last year, after Tuesday's conference at Johnson's Texas ranch. This new deflected attention from some other aspects of the new defense budget.

The Army will lose 15,000 men, authorized on a temporary

basis two years ago for an experimental air assault division.

The Air Force will begin a reach significant proportions in several years and probably will total more than 12,000 in the next 18 months.

The Navy will gain somewhat in authorized manpower, mainly for Polaris submarines, but will face recruiting difficulties because of speculation that the military draft may end.

The Army will continue development of its Nike-X anti-missile system but will not put it into production. McNamara will not approve deployment of Nike-X unless Congress simultaneously votes a big fallout shelter program.

The Air Force will be restricted to developing parts of a possible new strategic warplane, chiefly engines and electronics, despite its urging that a plane itself be built.

The Air Force Minuteman missile program will be limited to the presently authorized figure of 1,000, of which 650 now are operational. It wanted another 200. It will buy, however, more of the advanced Minuteman 2 missiles to replace older versions.

The Navy will give up several new warships it had wanted in the new budget.

The present prospect is that the new federal budget may reach \$103 billion, of which the defense share would be somewhat under \$50 billion.

This year's defense spending is \$49.8 billion and McNamara (Continued on Page 2)

would like to shave it next year. This makes for a tight squeeze because of heavy fixed costs. For example, the military, civilian and retired payroll runs to about \$20 billion a year.

Nearly all the rest is spent under contracts — for maintenance, operations, production and research. And the market for industry is going to tighten.

Requests for appropriation of

new money, to be spent over several years, will be cut in the new budget, thus indicating a downturn for future years.

Sheinwold On Bridge

Strong Regulation Encourages Players

National Men's Team Champion
In a well-regulated country the government would shoot a bridge player now and then to encourage the others. Only a chuckleheaded government would let East go around loose after he had messed up today's hand. He held only one important card, and he managed to play it at the wrong time.

West opened the ten of diamonds, and dummy's queen won. Declarer returned the ten of clubs from dummy, and East signalled with the seven. West won with the queen of clubs and thought about South's hand.

It seemed clear that South could develop three clubs to add to his three diamonds, and spades and hearts. If West sat still and twiddled his thumbs declarer would easily take nine tricks.

West could defeat the contract only if East had the queen of hearts and only if West led precisely the nine of hearts.

ASSURES THREE TRICKS
If declarer played low from dummy, the nine of hearts could win the trick. If declarer covered with dummy's ten, East would take the queen and return the suit; and eventually West's five would win a trick. If declarer put up dummy's ace of hearts at once the defenders would easily take three heart tricks.

No other heart would work as well as the nine. If West led the five of hearts, declarer would play low from dummy and force East to play his queen. Then dummy's A-10-4 would provide two heart stoppers.

As it happened, declarer played a low heart from dummy when West led the nine of hearts. East blithely played the queen of hearts, following the old rule of third hand high. Now dummy had two heart stoppers, and West's beautiful defense came to nothing.

Is it any wonder that West walked around for a week talking about firing squads.

DAILY QUESTION

Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: Spade J 9 8 5, Heart Q 7 3, Diamond 7 5 4 2, Club 7 4. What do you say?

Answer: Pass. You have good spade support, but the hand is too weak for any response. You have 3 points in high cards, 1 point for distribution, and perhaps 1 point additional for the jack of partner's bid suit. It still isn't enough for a response.

Evansville Aces Win 5 Straight; 1st Choice In UPI Rating Board

NEW YORK UPI — Evansville, heading for an unprecedented third national small college basketball title, today accomplished what had never been done before when it was named the unanimous first place choice of the United Press International ratings board.

Under head coach Arad McCutchan, the Purple Aces, national champions in 1960 and last season, have won five straight games downing such major powers as Iowa, Northwestern, Notre Dame, Georgia Washington and LSU. They were rewarded today with 35 first place mentions and a maximum 350 points.

Grambling, the only other undefeated team in the top 10 at 6-0, maintained a firm hold on second place while Southern Illinois and Fresno State remained third and fourth-ranked, respectively.

Pan American had the biggest jump among the leading teams, vaulting from seventh to fifth.

Akron and Wittenburg each were down a peg to sixth and places with Carson-Newman and Youngstown exchanged places with Carson-Newman moving up to be eighth-ranked. North Dakota, a newcomer to the upper echelon, rounded out the first 10.

Fresno State 6-1 narrowed its gap behind third-ranked Southern Illinois 4-2 with two victories.

Pan American, aided by wins over Texas Southern and Austin College, advanced two spots.

Akron 3-1 was idle last week and Wittenburg 6-2 dropped a one point decision to Muskingum before downing Oberlin and Marietta.

Carson-Newman, the winningest team in the ratings at 9-1, was up to eighth although Western Kentucky spoiled a perfect record.

Youngstown dropped one spot to ninth and North Dakota moved forward a spot to tenth despite its third loss of the campaign.

Butler Falls To Michigan 99-81

The nation's top-ranked basketball teams can breathe a little easier today — but not for long.

Michigan and the other highly regarded quintets finally earned a rest for Christmas, but the season is really only starting. A gruelling schedule of holiday tournaments and conference tilts is waiting for them right after Christmas.

First-ranked Michigan must have been touched by the holiday spirit Wednesday night or it would probably have won by even more than 99-81 over the Butler Bulldogs.

Butler got a 6-5 lead and that was about all. Cazzie Russell, Bill Buntin and Oliver Darden then bucketed 15 straight points to put the Wolverines in command 20-6.

Michigan Coach Dave Strack began putting in substitutes at that point. Russell was high for the Wolverines with 21 points and Dave Sanders paced Butler with 20.

Fourth-ranked San Francisco breezed by Utah State 86-71 to remain undefeated.

Cincinnati showed some of the class which earned it two straight NCAA championships by beating Oregon State 71-56, DePaul defeated pre-season favorite Seattle 91-77, and Ohio University got hot late in a seesaw game with Northwestern to win 88-67.

The Bearcats broke a 41-41 tie midway through the second half against favored Oregon State with eight straight points to set up their fifth straight win and sixth in seven games.

Jesse Nash, who scored 26 points including 12 of 13 free throws, led a DePaul surge to end a two-game losing streak against Seattle.

Ohio U. came on strong after intermission to turn back Northwestern of the Big Ten. Sophomore guard Tom Davis was high for the winners with 23 tallies.

The festivities continue Saturday with another North-South battle in the Blue-Gray game at Montgomery, Ala., and the Sun bowl matching Georgia and Texas Tech at El Paso, Tex.

Still to come in the next two weeks are Michigan vs. Oregon State in the Rose Bowl, Arkansas vs. Nebraska in the Cotton Bowl; Alabama vs. Texas in the Orange Bowl and Syracuse vs. Louisiana State in the Sugar Bowl, all on New Year's Day; Florida State vs. Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl and the East-West Shrine game on Jan. 2; the Hula Bowl on Jan. 8 and the Senior Bowl game on Jan. 9.

A crowd of almost 50,000 is expected at Miami's Orange Bowl for the Shrine game which matches the class of the nation's graduating seniors. This 17th meeting of the teams will be televised nationally starting at 3 p. m. EST.

One fascinating feature of this contest is that it pits the last two Heisman trophy winners against each other. Staubach was designated the country's outstanding collegiate player as a junior while Huarte earned that distinction in the 1964 campaign.



Article Should Interest Drinkers Of Beverages

NEW YORK UPI — A newly compiled "natural history of cirrhosis" could be of keen, personal interest to many persons in this age which commonly floats holidays and social functions on alcoholic beverages.
For one thing it questioned if many cases really result from hepatitis, an inflammation of the liver not associated with drinking. Of the cases of cirrhosis of this supposed type prior bouts of hepatitis could be proved in only 15 per cent.
This compared with the cases of "fatty nutritional cirrhosis" which is considered the drinking man's cirrhosis. Of these cases 89 per cent had been preceded by long-time heavy drinking. And in the case of alleged hepatitis-caused cirrhosis 56 per cent involved heavy drinking.
The "natural history" covered 1,168 men and women with cirrhosis advanced enough to put them in hospitals and in danger of dying of it. Only 174 were non-drinkers.
It deflated the "generally inflated estimate" of the medical

side and dance the story of the coming of Christ. The dances enact ancient Spanish miracle plays.

Early in December, the luminaries go up on the flat roofs and walls of Santa Fe homes. Traditionally the lights lead the way for the lost Christ Child, El Nido Perdido, who will walk among the faithful at Christmas time.

The fiesta of the Virgin of Guadalupe begins Dec. 11 and honors the patroness of the Americas. Then comes the nine-day re-enactment of the holy family's search for shelter in Bethlehem.

In Rio Grande villages around Santa Fe, folk plays with local casts are performed. Stories of the ancient shepherds — Los Pastores — are retold. Churches in the village are lighted by incense candles made by the natives especially for Christmas.

Finally on Christmas Day, Santa Fe bursts with fiesta gaiety. In homes are roasted turkeys stuffed with pinon nut dressings. There are also marzantois — roast suckling pig. And there is corn, rice, squash, tortillas and a glass or two of sugary chokecherry wine.

Shouts of "Merry Christmas" fill the city. Or, as even Scrooge might have said to Tiny Tim if Dickens' tale had been set here, "Feliz Navidad, Tiny Tim. Feliz Navidad."

Many Perish In Tidal Wave

MADRAS, India UPI — Hundreds of persons died when a tidal wave hit Dhanuskodi and Rameshwaram Wednesday, according to reports reaching here today. Estimates of the dead ranged from 200 to 500.

A hurricane preceded the tidal wave. Dhanuskodi, on the southeastern coast, is a terminus for the ferry to Ceylon. Many of the victims apparently were swept away when the wave hit a customs shed in the harbor area.

Some reports said many drownings occurred at Rameshwaram, an island adjacent to Dhanuskodi with a population of 1,000 persons.

A railway linking the island to the mainland was washed out. An emergency airlift was reported underway, with one Indian air force C47 plane carrying 3,000 food packets for the marooned inhabitants of the island.

Russ Get Flour For Home Baking

MOSCOW UPI — Russians will have flour for home baking over the New Year's holidays.

For only the second time in more than a year, authorities arranged to distribute next week thousands of tons of wheat flour to citizens who have not been able to buy it since shortly after the disastrous 1963 grain harvest, which caused massive imports from the United States and other countries.

Despite a bountiful harvest this year, flour is still not sold in the stores but there are expectations it may be back on the shelves next year.

U. S. Attitude Is Different From Its Stand In 1801

Back in 1801 when Barbary pirates operating out of Tripoli were molesting U. S. shipping, the United States put a stop to it by sending in warships and Marines.

But times have changed and just how much they have changed may be seen by looking just a little farther along the Mediterranean Coast to the United Arab Republic.

It is one of the contradictions of modern diplomacy that despite violent attacks on U. S. lives and property within the U. A. R., the Nasser government sees nothing inconsistent in pressing at the same time for stepped up shipping of American food.

And, while there may be some delay, it seems probable that they will get it. It is of a pattern established throughout the world among new and under-developed nations who see no relationship between violent anti-U. S. outbursts, usually organized by the government, and their continuing right to U. S. aid.

In the first of two incidents, a mob presumably made up of African students and some Egyptians attacked and burned the John F. Kennedy Library attached to the U. S. Embassy in Cairo.

A grudging government apology came two days later, followed later by a bland announcement that Nasser would make a gift to the library of 1,000 books and a set of encyclopedias.

Then on Dec. 19 came the shooting down of an unarmed U. S. oil company-airplane by Russian-built Egyptian MIG's and the deaths of the two persons aboard, one an American.

That's because the Yuletide spirit in Santa Fe is a mixture of Indians, luminarias and pinatas, singing processions and holiday fun.

The bah-humbug visitor who isn't on his guard will be transported back 2,000 years in Santa Fe when he sees the barren New Mexico hills.

Lonely shepherds will tend their flocks as they did in Palestine. Narrow dirt roads wind up hillsides to tiny adobe villages. This natural Biblical setting just isn't the place for a bah-humbug attitude.

In pueblos and villages surrounding Santa Fe, natives enact Los Posados — The Processions. In one of the oldest Spanish traditions, groups of children spend nine days going door to door seeking shelter for the Virgin Mary. The answer for them as it was for Mary and Joseph is always the same: "There is no room here."






