Criminal Court.

In the Criminal Court this morning, Judge Long on the bench, the following business was transacted:

The case of the State vs. Alvin Hauschild, wherein defendant was charged with the larceny of a horse and buggy from E. P. Beauchamp sometime since, was called and tried before the Court. The trial resulted in acquittal on the ground that defendant hired the horse of an unknown party. Tennant for State, Dunningan for defense.

The case of the State vs. Henderson Bishop, in which defendant was charged with the larceny of a set of harness from Ryan, the auctioneer, came to trial before a jury, and resulted in a verdict which read as follows: "We, the jury, find the defendant guilty, as charged in the indictment, and assess his punishment at ten years imprisonment in the State Prison, disfranchisement for one day, and he to pay a fine of one cent."

The court, when the verdict in this case was rendered, adjourned until tomorrow morning, when several liquor cases will come up for adjudication. Tennant conducts all cases for the State, Davis having retired at the beginning of the present term. Mr. Davis was exceedingly successful in his prosecutions; in fact we never had so efficient a Prosecuting Attorney in our Criminal Court as Mr. Davis. Mr. Tennant starts out well and will succeed.
